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Introduction

The El Camino College (ECC) Annual Factbook is a reference source containing trend data about students, student outcomes, instructional programs and services, and employees' distribution. The data in the Factbook provides background information to facilitate policy analysis and decision making. It is a useful tool in college and departmental planning, grant preparation, and in the accreditation process. The information provided is expected to be used to objectively evaluate programs and practices as well as visualize the trends that affect El Camino College's current and future operations.

The Annual Factbook presents tables and graphs that contain enrollment trends for the last five academic years. Pie charts represent enrollment for the most recent academic year. Information has been disaggregated by age, gender, and ethnicity where appropriate.

Data Sources

Demographic and enrollment data on ECC students was provided by the Chancellor's Office. Some of the data in the Special Programs section was extracted from the college's student database. In addition, data from the National Student Clearinghouse was used to provide transfer destination information. The National Student Clearinghouse is a national, non-profit organization that offers access to enrollment and degree records.

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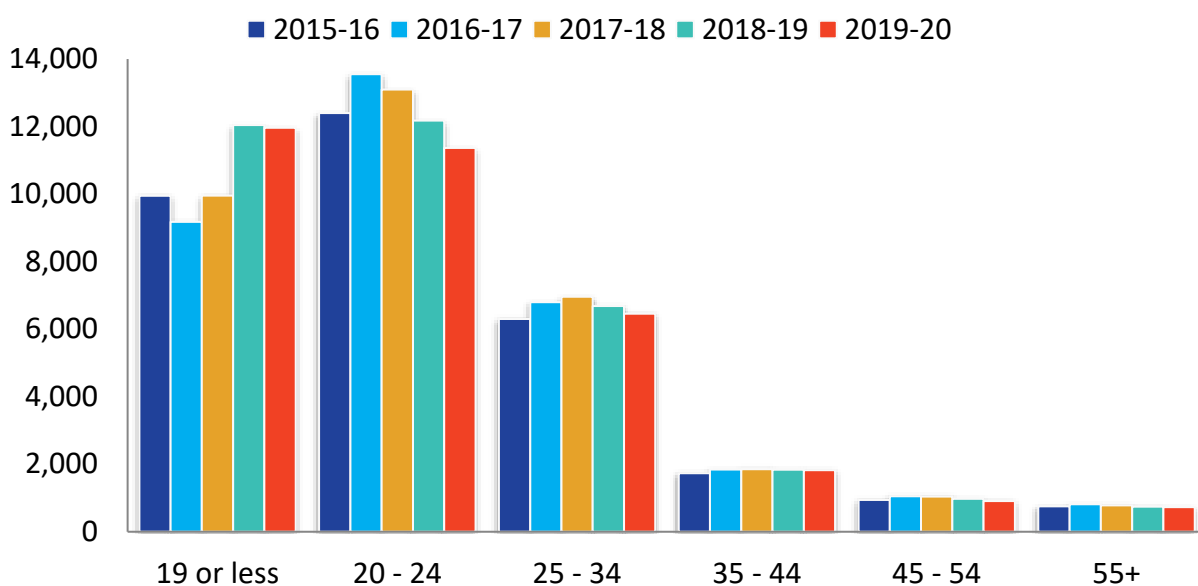
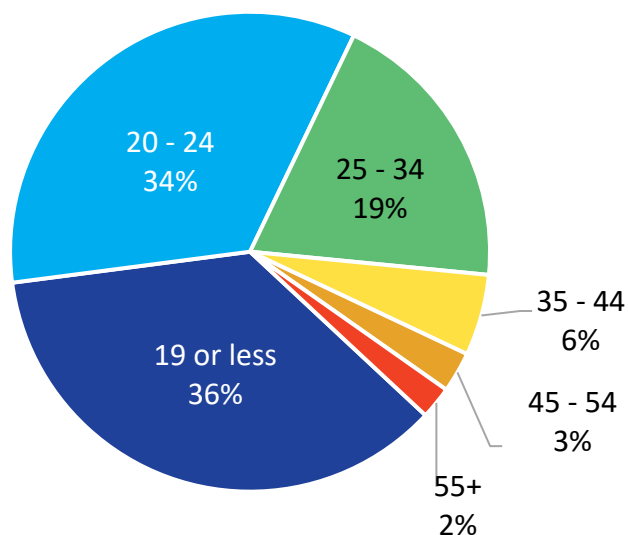
STUDENT ENROLLMENT TRENDS



Age

When looking at unduplicated student enrollment, in the last 5 years, 70% of enrolled students were less than 25 years of age. Working adults ages 25-44 comprised 25% of enrolled students while 5% of students were ages 45 and older. Enrollment among students ages 20-24 and 45-54 both decreased by 7% from 2018-2019 to 2019-2020.

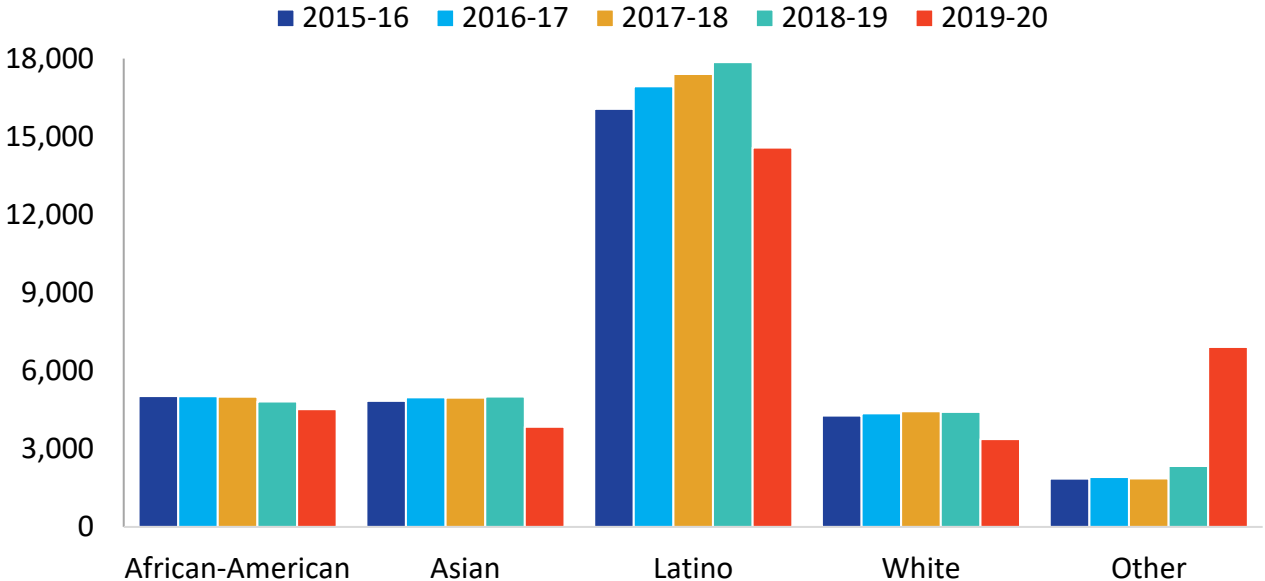
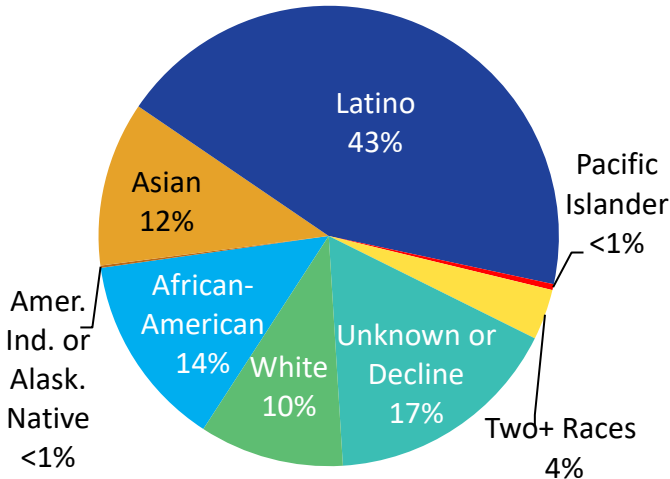

Ethnicity

Latinos represent the largest ethnic group on campus, comprising an average 50% of the student population over the last 5 years. In 2019-20, decrease in counts for each race/ethnicity category is due to a statewide coding error affecting 2019 applicants. This resulted in an increase in the "Unknown or Decline" counts.

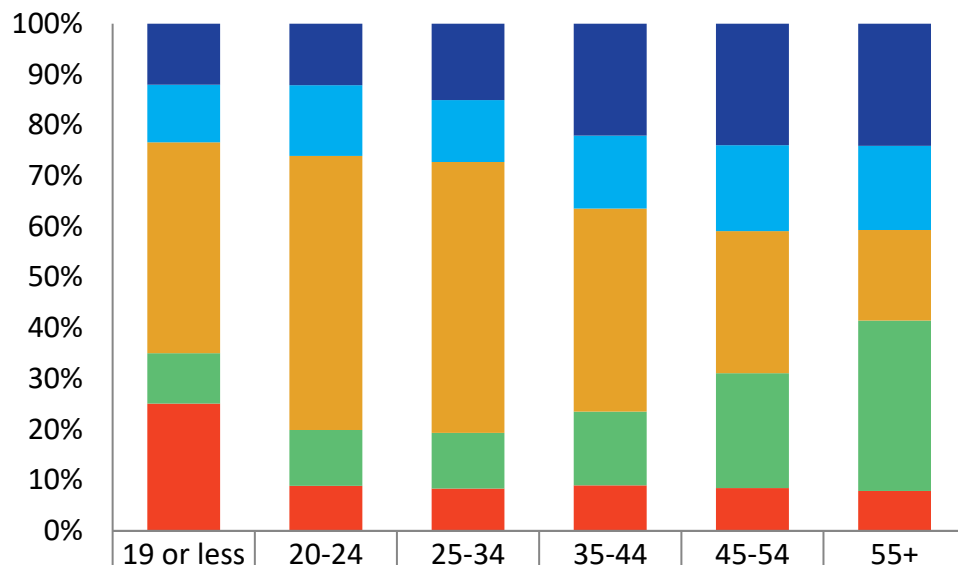

Age by Ethnicity

Most ethnic groups at El Camino College represent varying percentages of the student body relative to age group. In 2019-20, African-American and White students are more likely to be older while Latino students are more likely to be of traditional college age (19 to 24 years old) and in their late 20's and early 30's. Less pronounced variability is found among other ethnic groups.

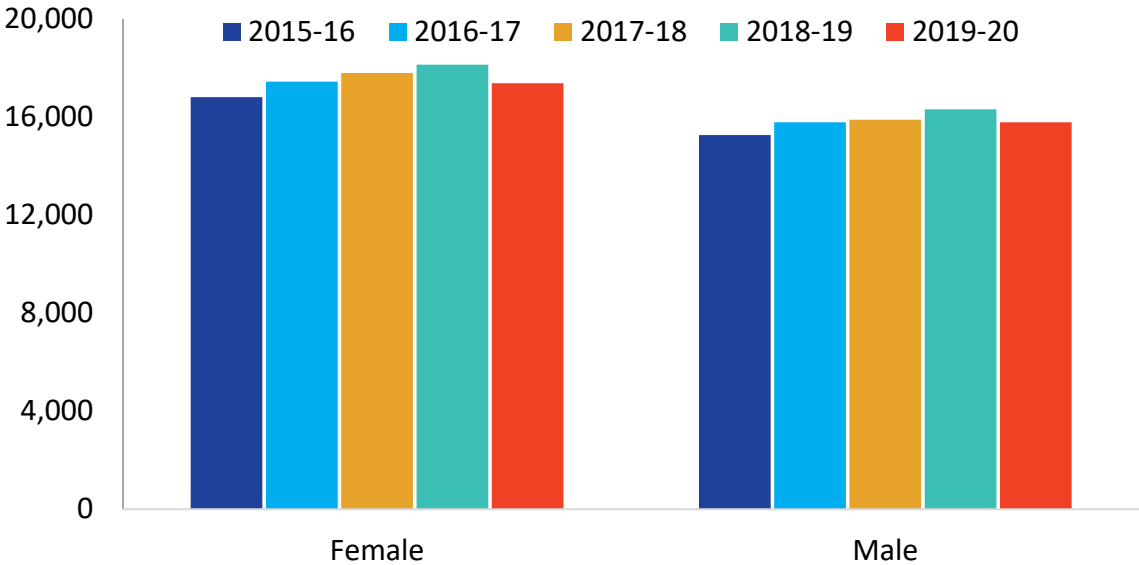
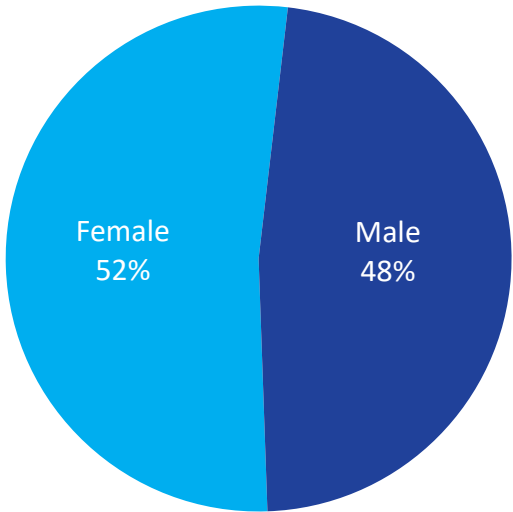

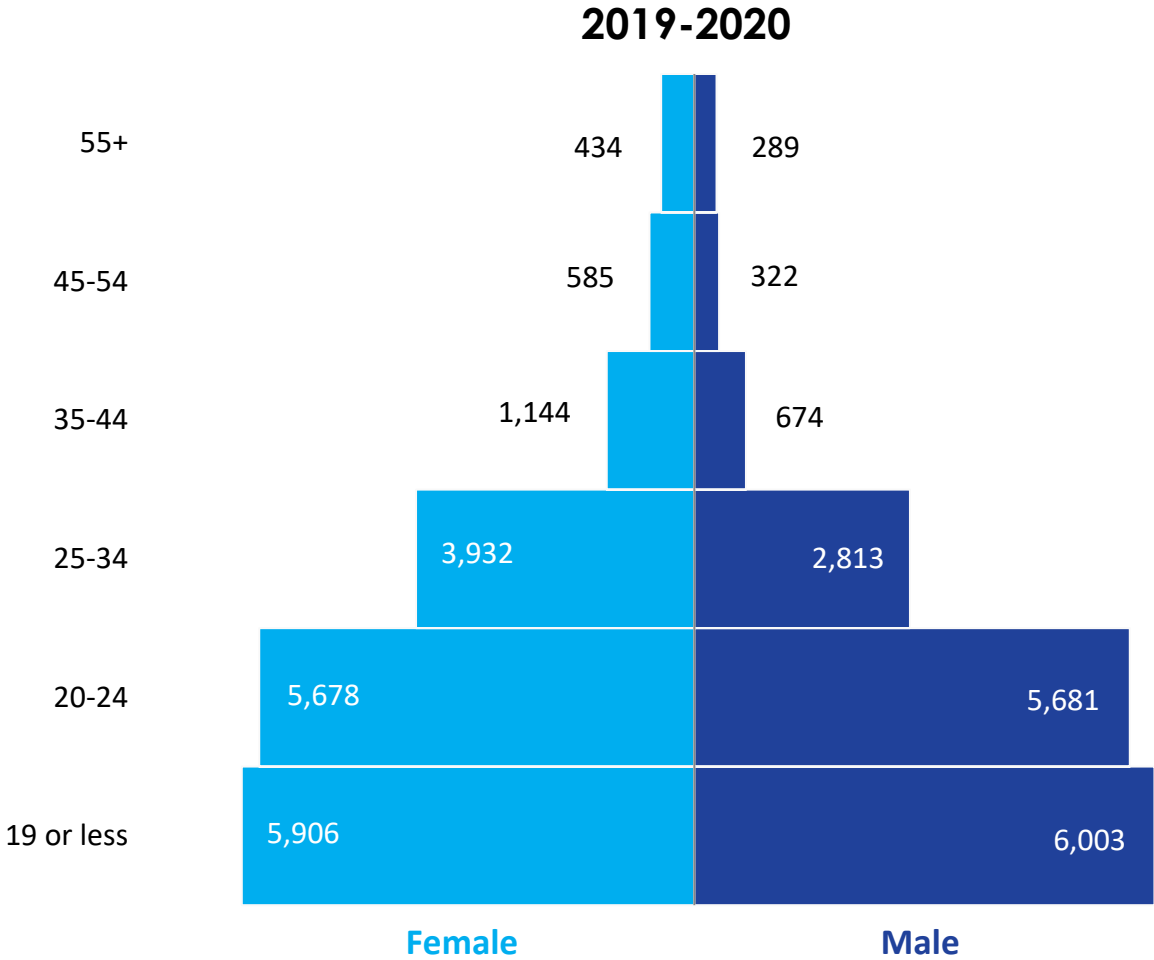
Overall, 10% more women than men have attended ECC in the last 5 years. The greatest difference was found in 2017-2018 when 12% more women than men attended ECC.

Gender by Age

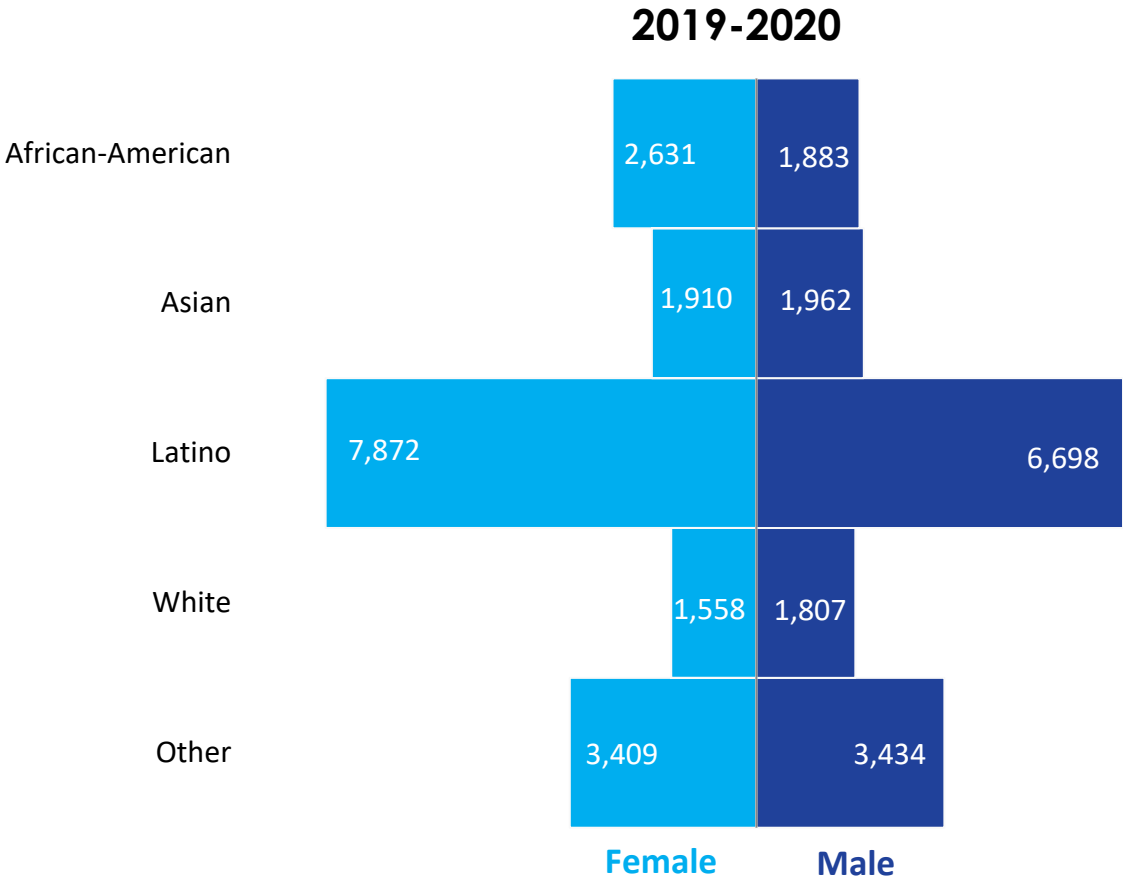
El Camino College is predominantly made up of young adults. In 2019-20, the largest gender differences were among adult students age 35 to 54 where females made up over 60% of these age groups.

In 2019-2020, 58% of African American students were female while 54% of Latino students were female. Over half of Asian and White students were male.



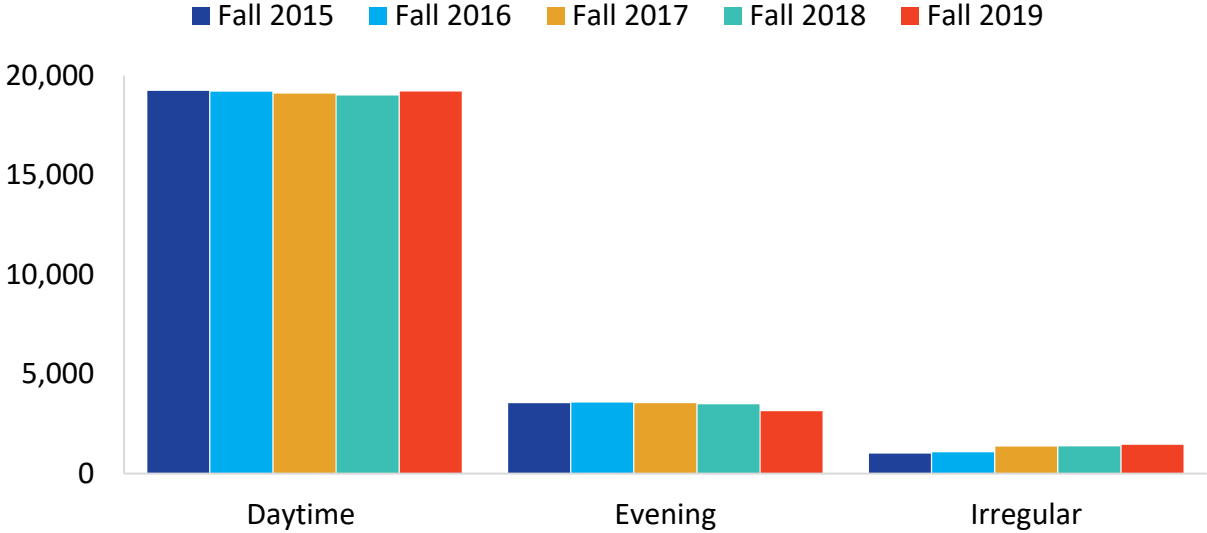
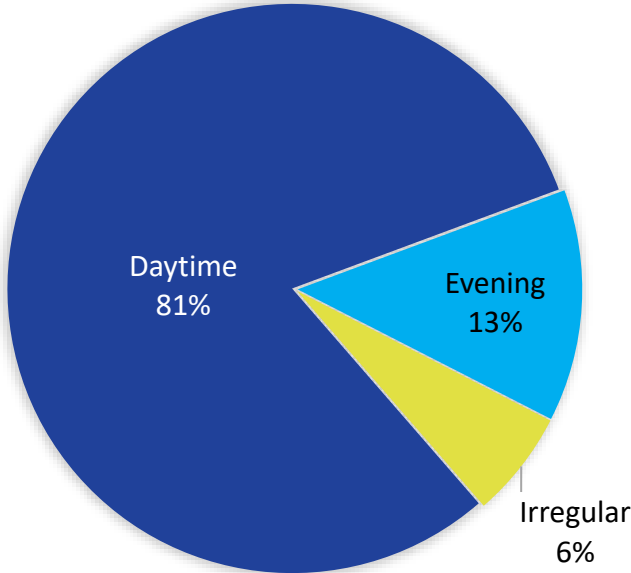

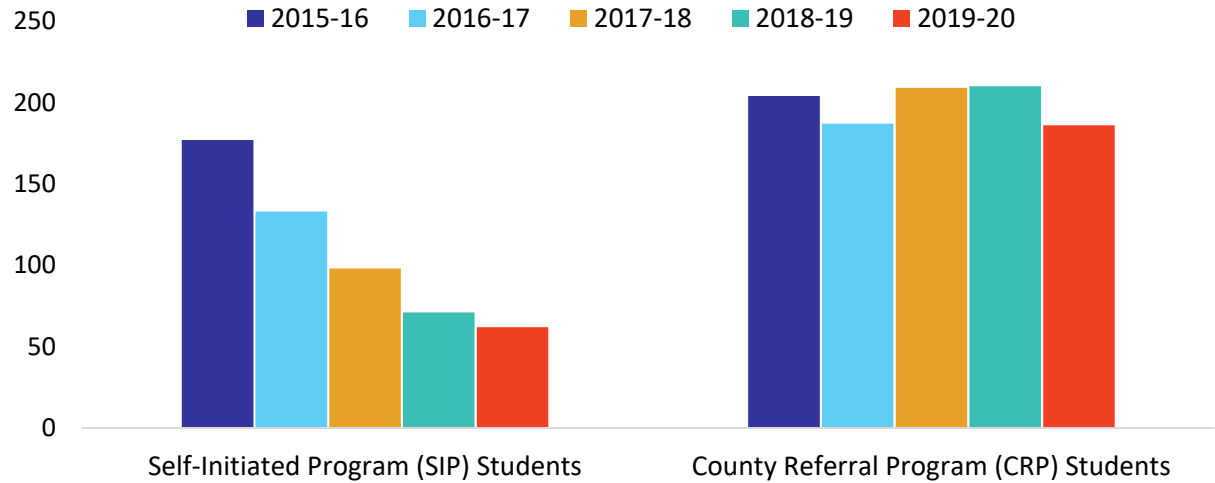
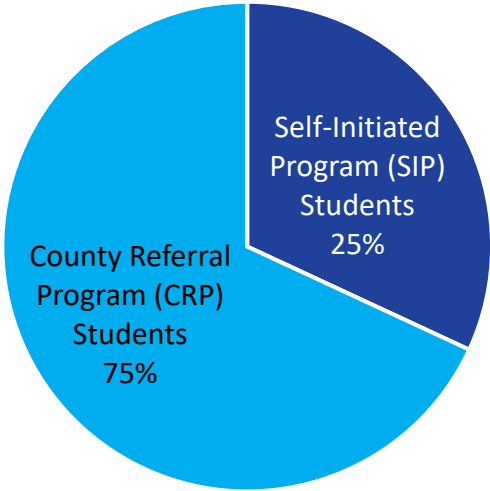
2 SPECIAL PROGRAMS



CalWORKs

CalWORKs funds assist single parents who are receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), and those transitioning off welfare. This program helps students achieve long-term self-sufficiency through coordinated student services. Approximately 1% of the ECC student population participated in CalWORKs in 2019-20. In the last 5 years, the number of CalWORKs participants has steadily decreased. This is a reflection of a decrease in CalWORKs participation statewide.

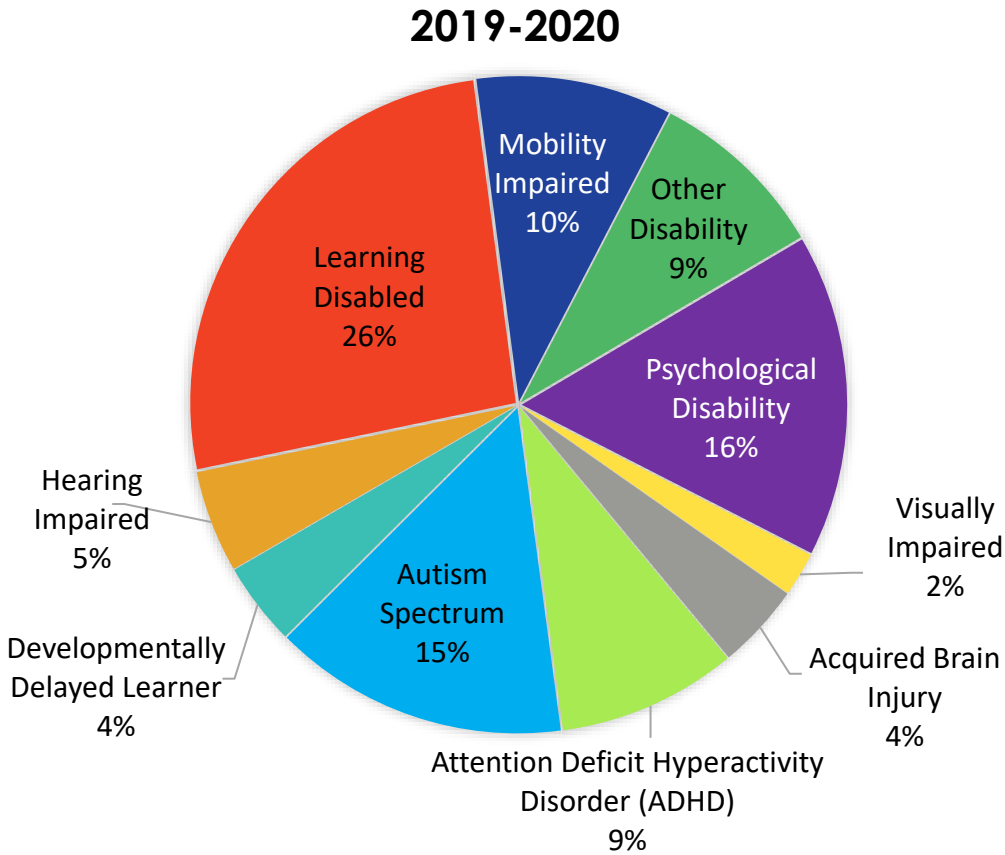

Disabled Student Programs & Services

About 5% of ECC students have a registered disability. The most common disability is learning disabilities followed by psychological disabilities. In 2016-17, students with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) and autism spectrum were reported for the first time. In 2019-20, 8% of ECC students with a registered disability had ADHD while 15% were on the autism spectrum.

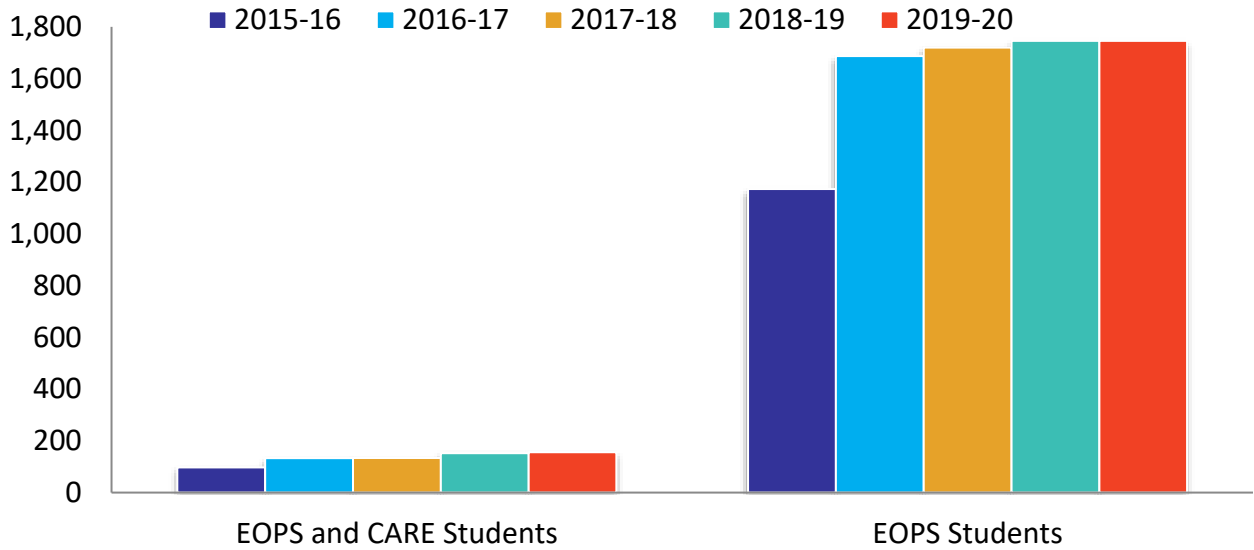
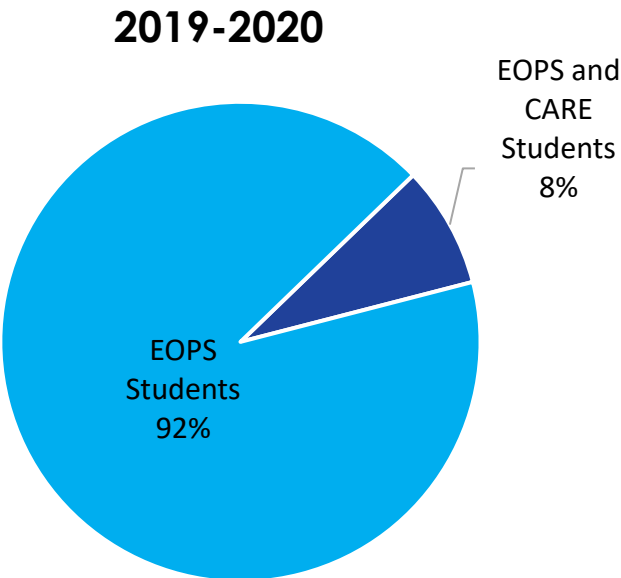

Extended Opportunity Programs & Services (EOPS)

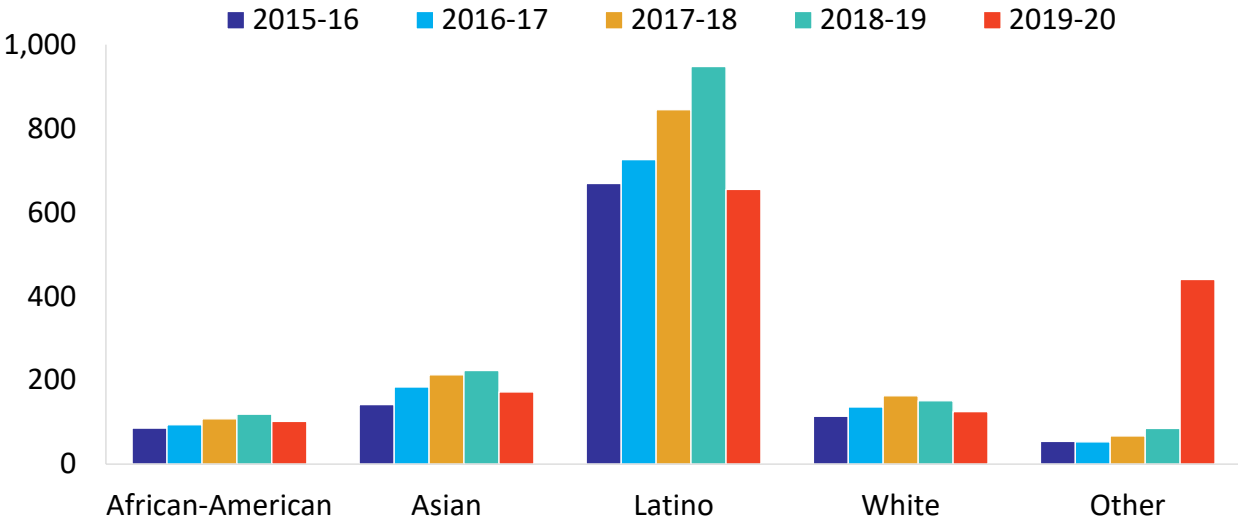
Extended Opportunity Program and Services (EOPS) is designed to assist low income and educationally disadvantaged students achieve their educational goals at El Camino College. It provides eligible students with support services in the areas of counseling, peer support, financial assistance, transferring and tutorial services. Approximately 5% of ECC students were in EOPS and CARE, a single parent support program for EOPS. In 2019-20, the number of students who participated in EOPS and CARE increased by 2% from the previous year.

First Year Experience (FYE)

The First Year Experience (FYE) program is designed to assist and prepare first year college students to be academically successful by providing student services such as early registration, orientation, counseling and learning community courses and peer mentoring. In the last 5 years, there has been an average of 1,335 first-time students who have participated in the FYE program. In the last 5 years, there has been an average of 58% of FYE students who were Latino.

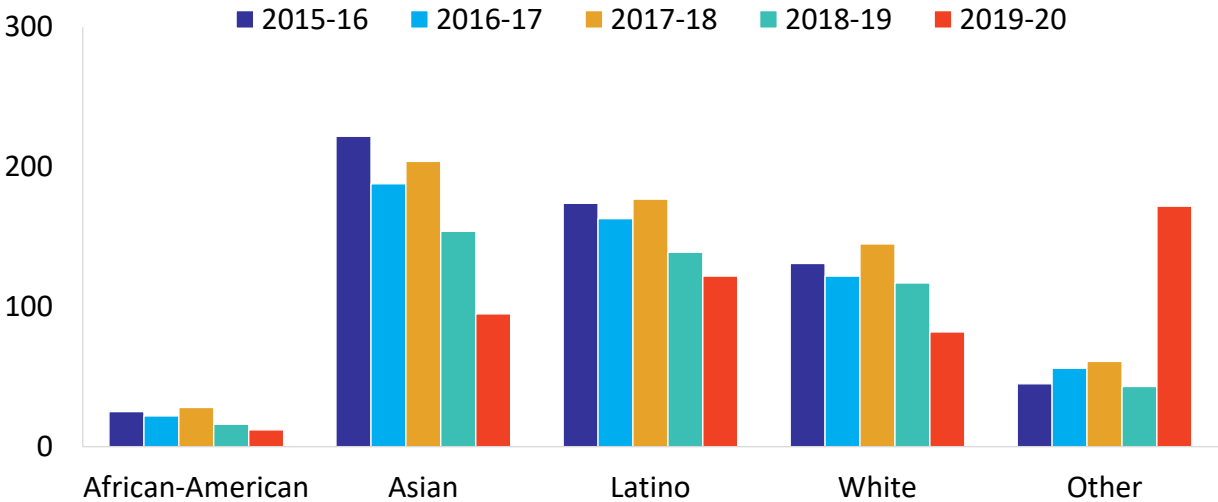

Honors Transfer Program

The Honors Transfer Program is designed to better prepare the highly motivated student to transfer successfully to a university and complete a Bachelor's degree. In 2017-18, there were over 600 students in the program. In 2018-19 and 2019-20, student participation in the program decreased to 469 and 483, respectively. In the last 5 years, there has been an average of 31% of Honors Transfer students who were Asian.

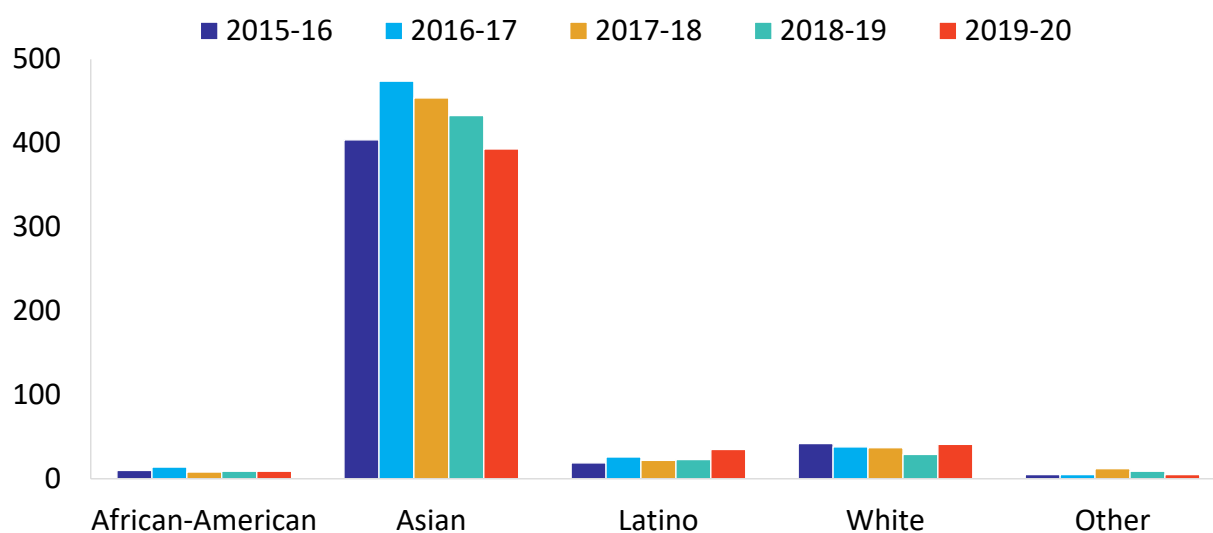

The program assists students who are studying in the United States on F-1 visa and provides services including academic counseling and access to immigration advisers. In the last 5 years, there has been an average of 511 students who were part of the International Students program. In the last 5 years, there has been an average of 84% of international students who were Asian.

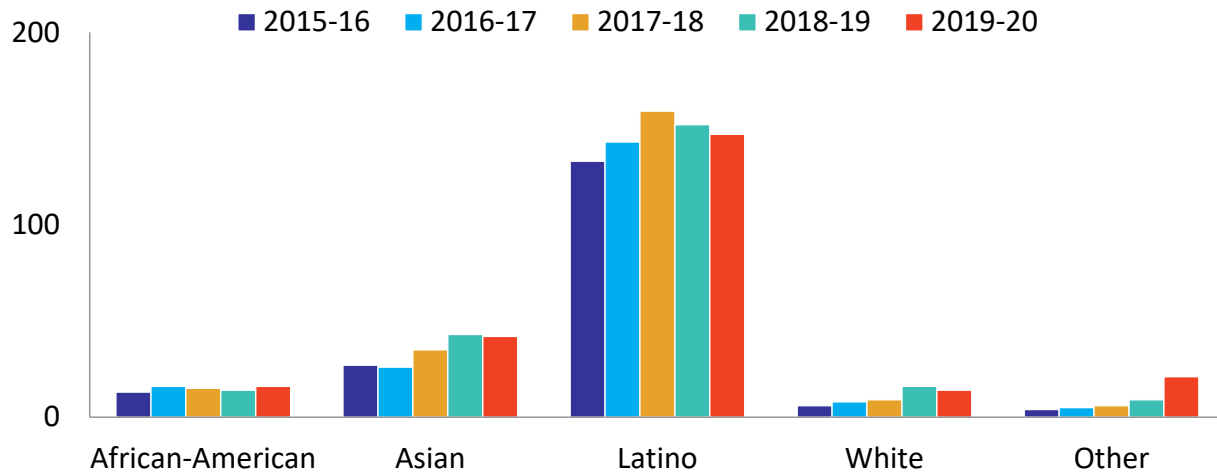

Mathematics, Engineering, Science Achievement (MESA)

The Mathematics, Engineering, Science Achievement (MESA) program is based on a rigorous academic program that uses various components to support students pursuing math and science-based degrees. Participation in MESA has steadily increased in the last 5 years from 183 students in 2015-16 to 240 students in 2019-20. In the last 5 years, there has been an average of 71% of MESA students who were Latino.

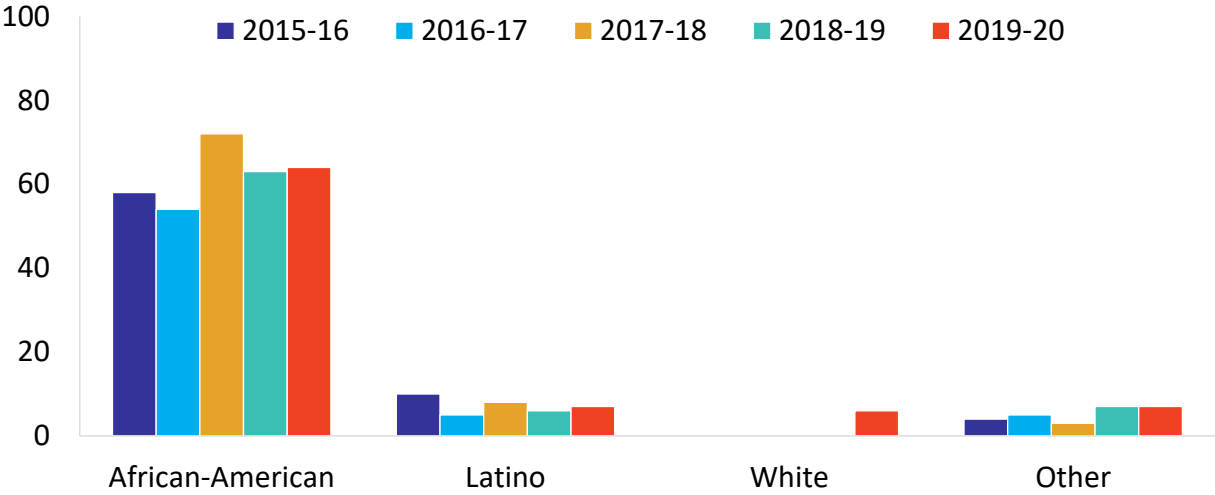

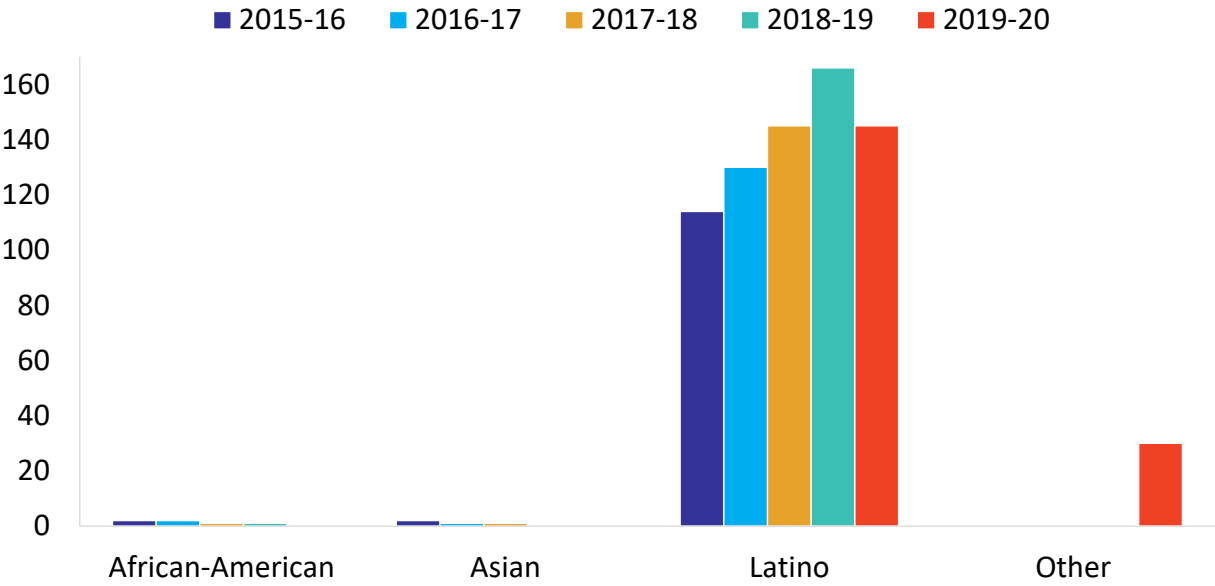

Puente Program

The mission of the Puente program is to increase the number of educationally underserved students who enroll in four-year colleges, earn degrees, and return to the community as leaders and mentors. Participation in the Puente program has gradually increased in the last 5 years from 118 students in 2015-16 to 175 students in 2019-20. In the last 5 years, there has been an average of 95% of Puente students who were Latino.

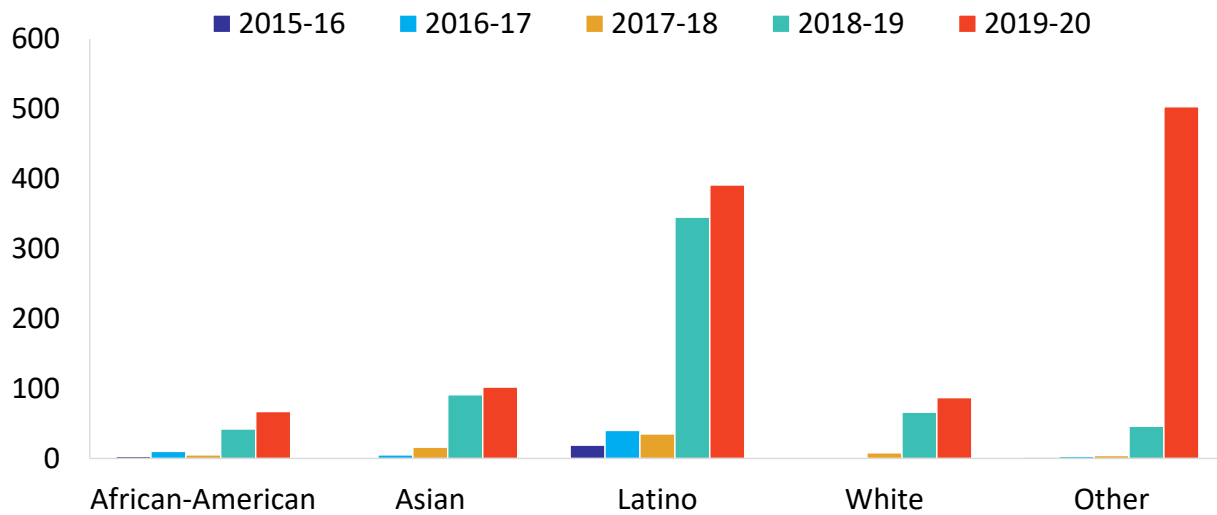

South Bay Promise

The South Bay Promise program offers an affordable pathway for students directly from high school to college. First-time full-time students have their first and second-year fees waived and are offered counseling and additional services. Participation in the South Bay Promise program has increased significantly in the last 5 years from 24 students in 2015-16 to 1,150 students in 2019-20. In the last 5 years, there has been an average of 43% of South Bay Promise students who were Latino.

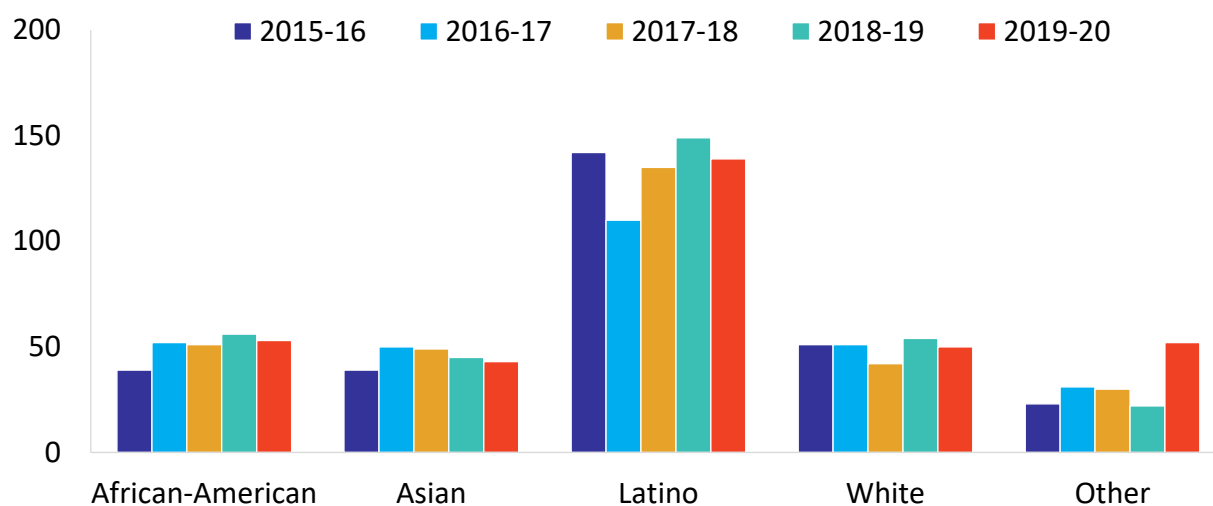

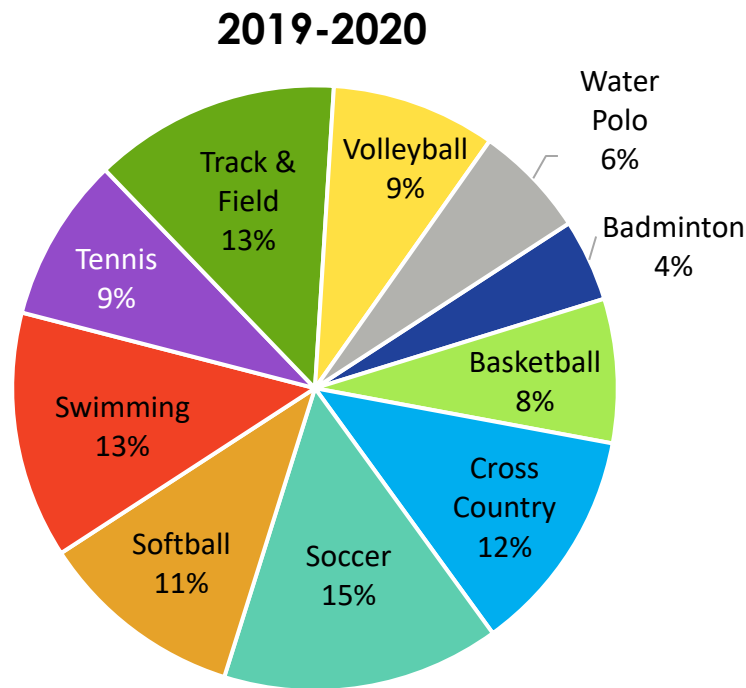

Student Athletes - Females

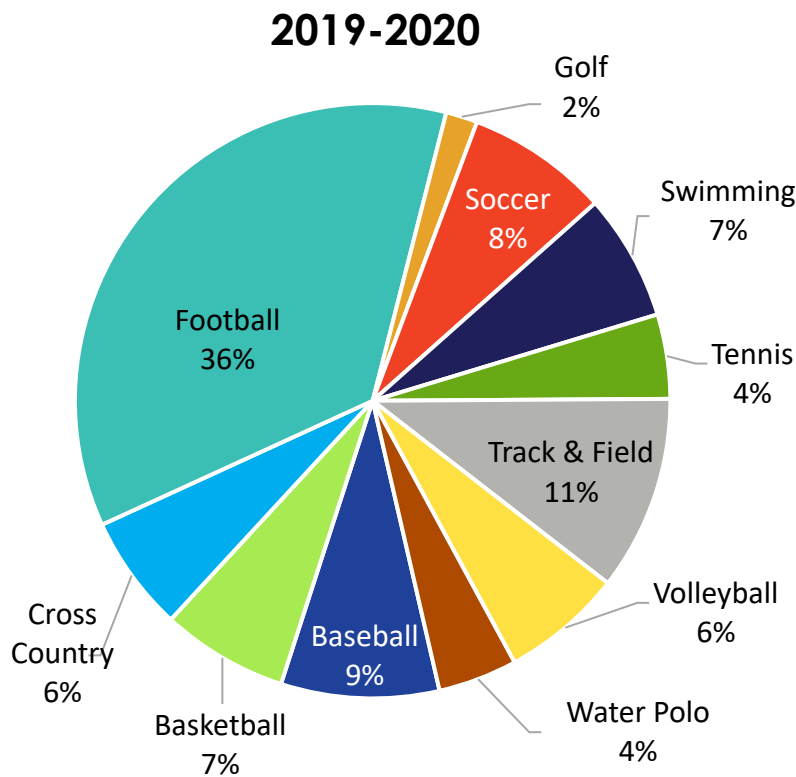

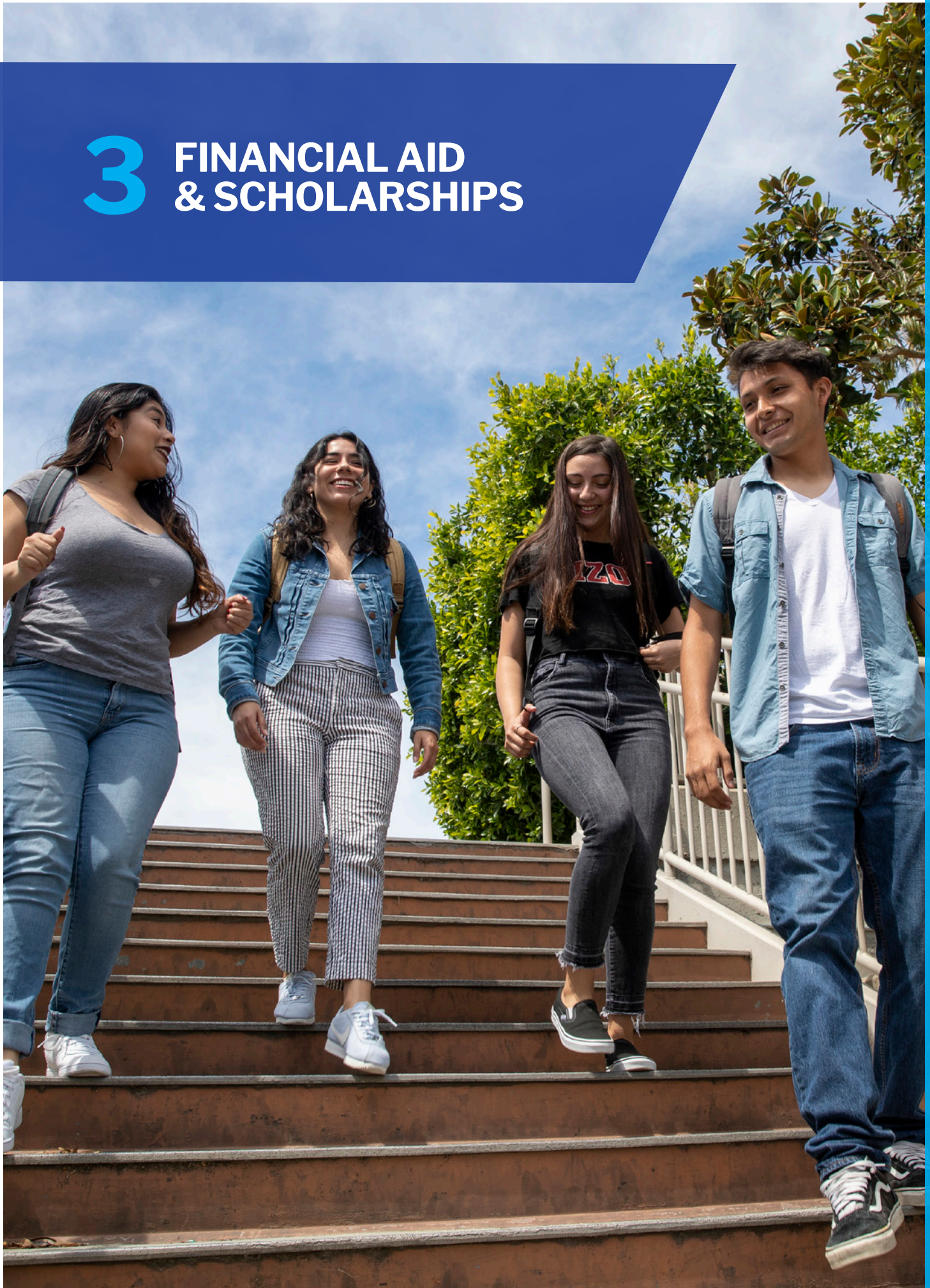
Student Athletes - Males

From 2018-19 to 2019-20, male student athlete participation decreased by 6%. The largest male sport is football, with an average of 106 players per year. In 2016-17, the men's baseball team were conference champions and made a Final Four appearance. 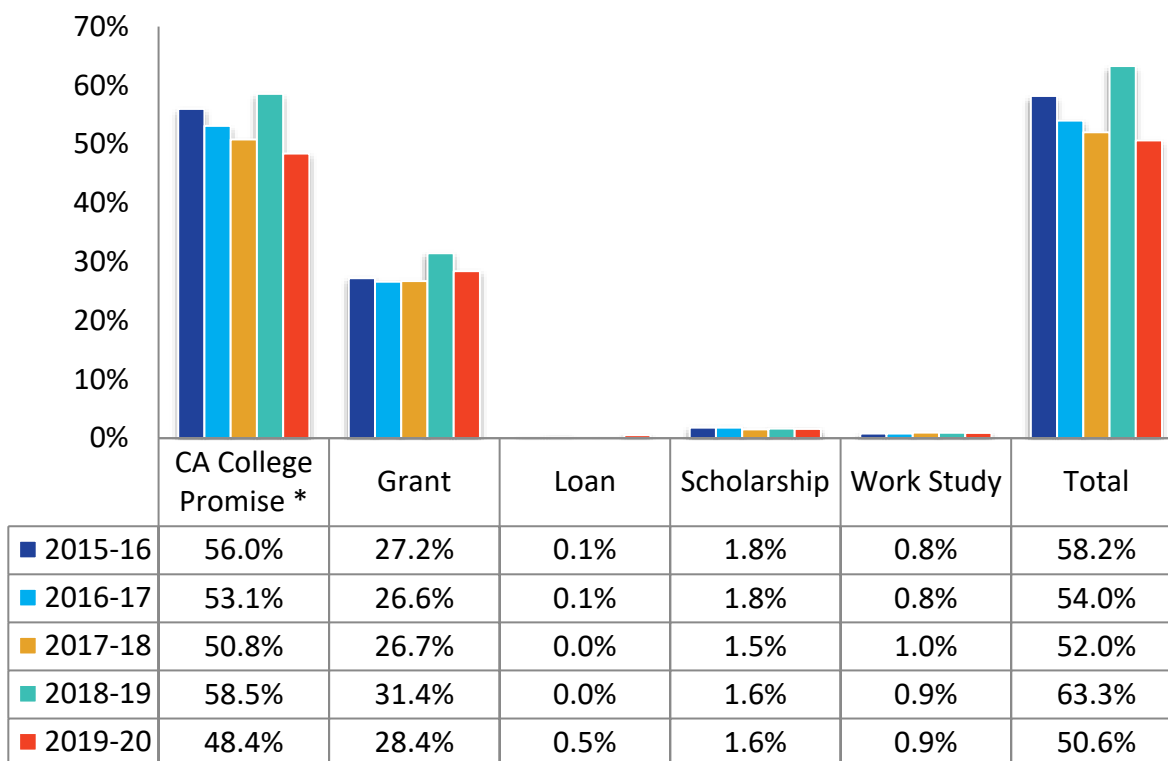
3 FINANCIAL AID & SCHOLARSHIPS



Award Type

Fifty-one percent of all El Camino College students received financial aid in 2019-20, a twelve percent decrease from the previous year. The largest Financial Aid program is the California College Promise Grant with 48% of all ECC students receiving the award in 2019-20. In 2019-20, the number of students who received a loan increased significantly due to the fact that El Camino College is now participating in the Federal Direct Loan Program which includes subsidized, unsubsidized, and Parent PLUS loans.

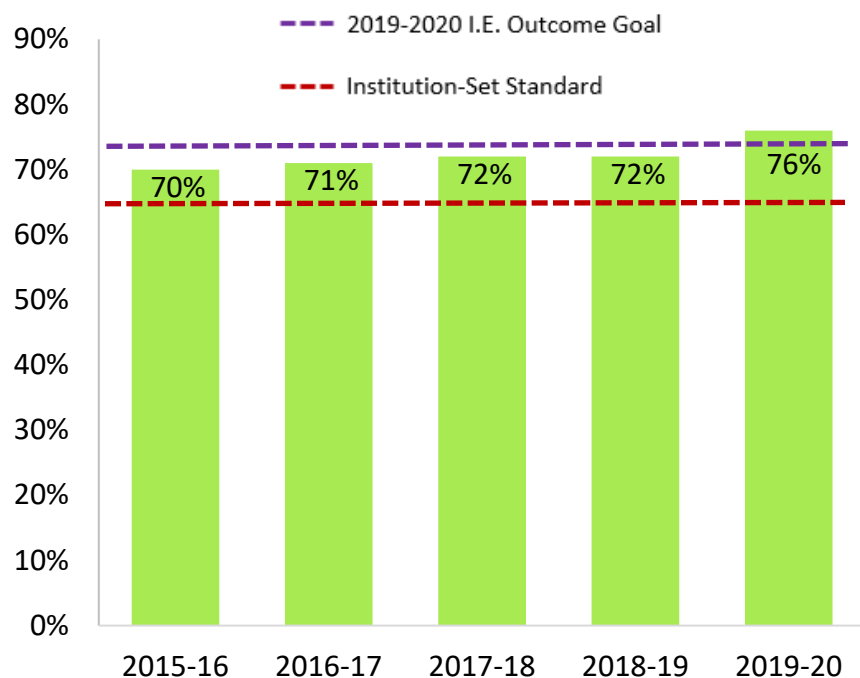

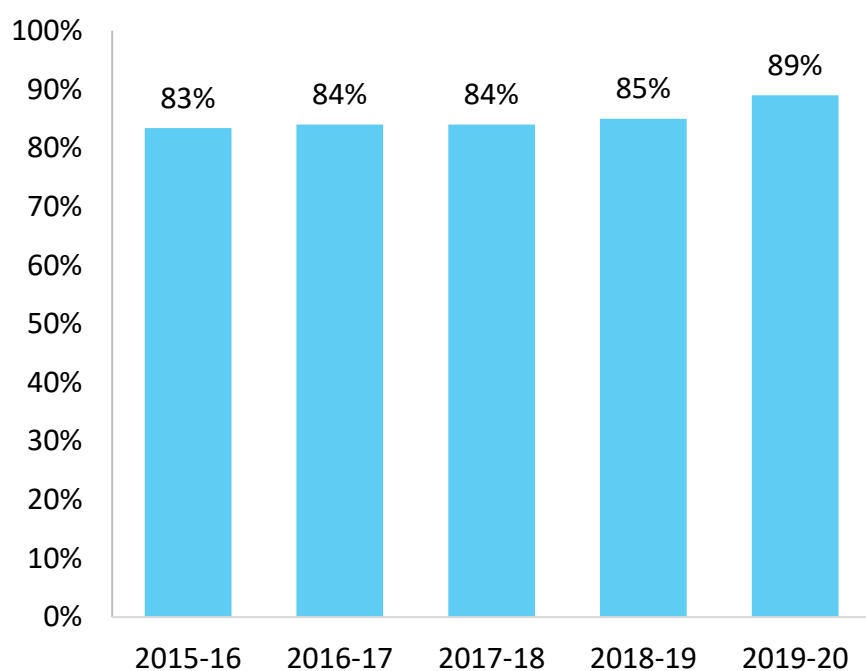


Course Success Rate *

The course success rate is the percentage of students who receive an A, B, C, or Pass as a final course grade out of all students enrolled as of the census date.

ECC has an ACCJC Institution-Set Standard of 65% and an Institutional Effectiveness (I.E) Outcome goal of 74% by the year 2019-2020.

The course completion rate is the percentage of students who remain enrolled through the end of a course out of all students enrolled on census date. It is the percentage of students who did not drop late or withdraw.

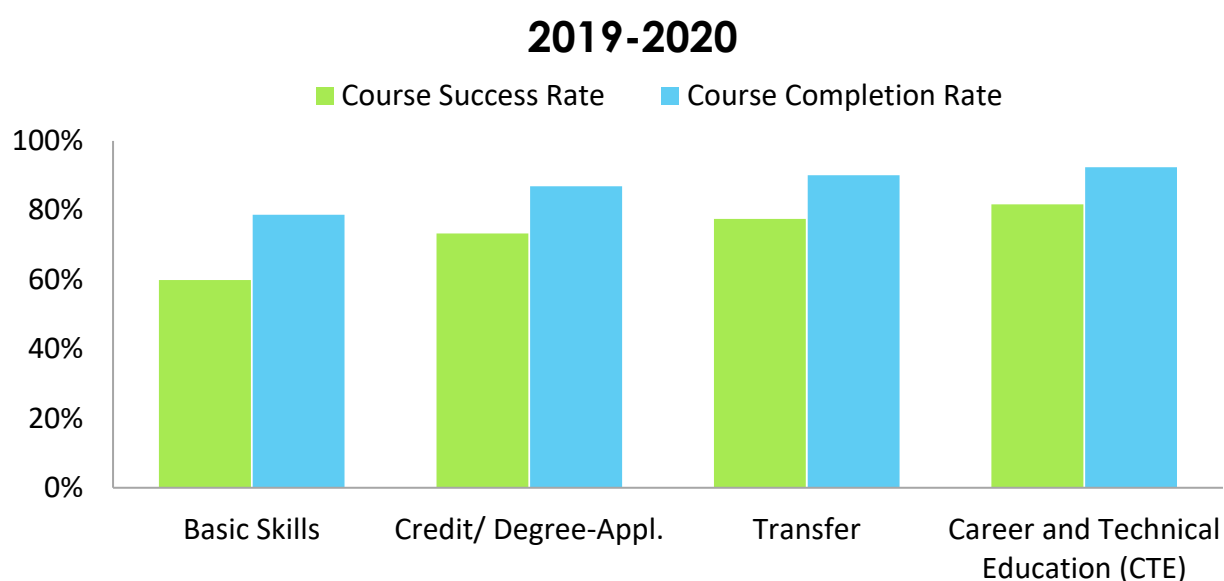

Course Success and Completion Rates by Course Type

The course success rate for transfer level courses in the last 5 years averages 74%, slightly higher than the overall and basic skills courses. The average course completion rate for transfer level courses (85%) is also slightly higher than the course completion rate for basic skills courses.

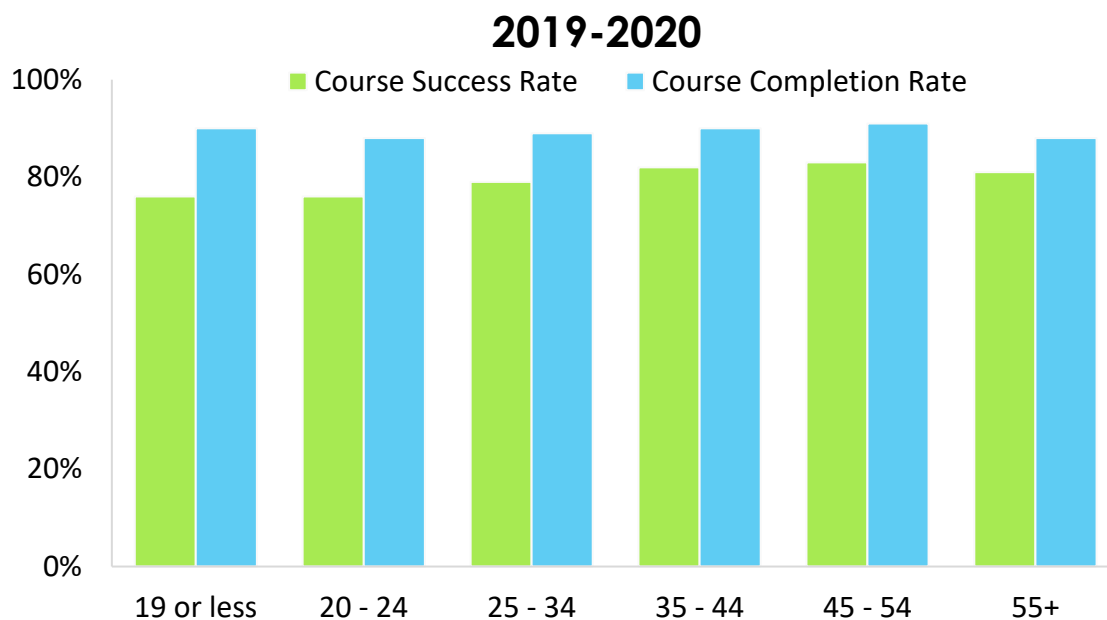
The 5-year average course success rate for credit/degree-applicable courses is 63% while the 5-year average course completion rate is 82%. The 5-year average course success and overall course completion rates for Career and Technical Education (CTE) courses are 78% and 89%, respectively.

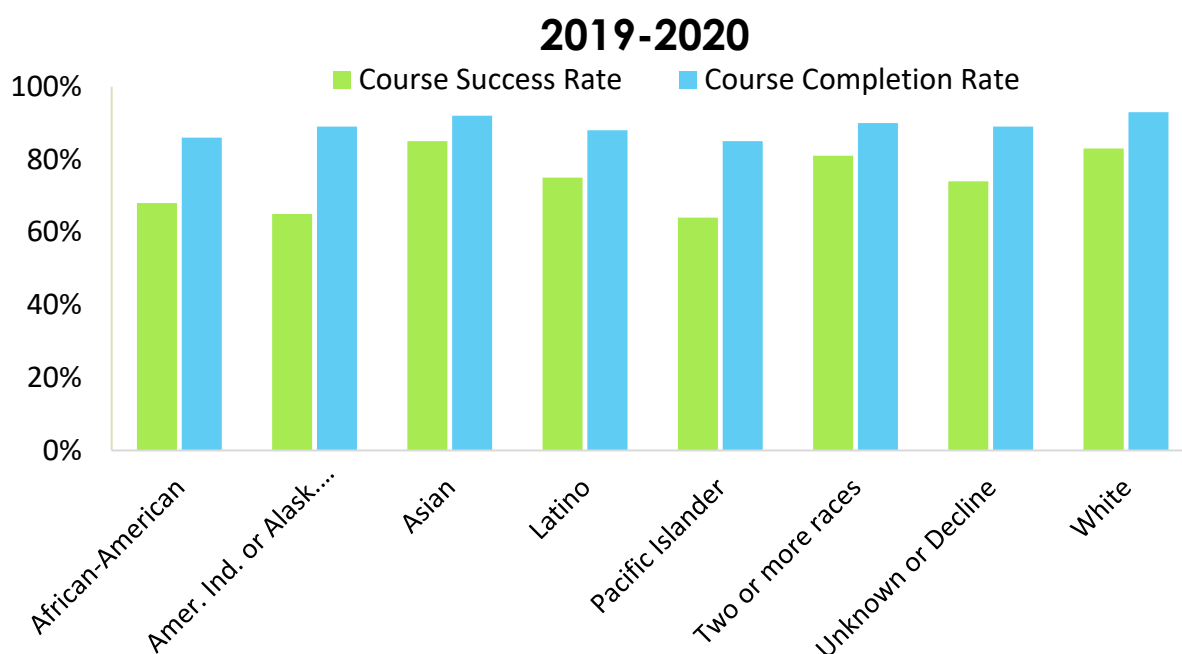

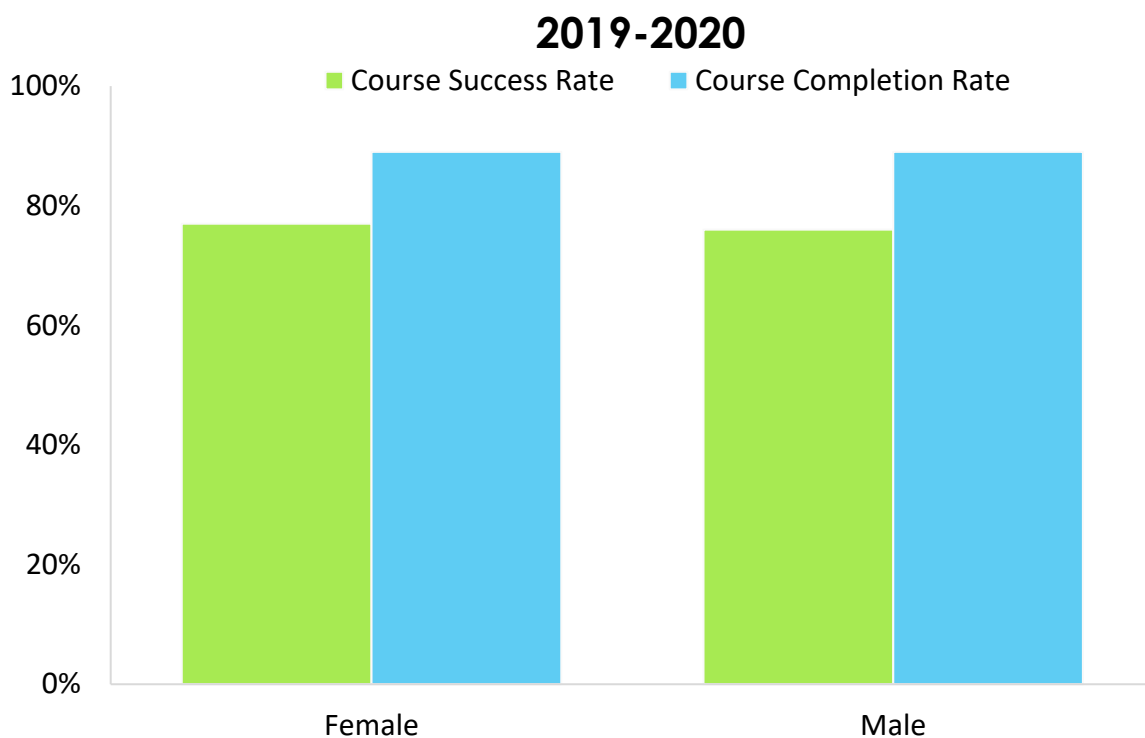
Course success rates for African-American students have gradually increased over the last 5 years. In 2019-20, African-American students had a 68% course success rate, an increase of eight percentage points from 2013-14. In 2019-20, Latino students' course success rate was 75% while White and Asian students had course success rates of 83% and 81%, respectively.

Course success and course completion rates for female and male students have gradually increased over the last 5 years. 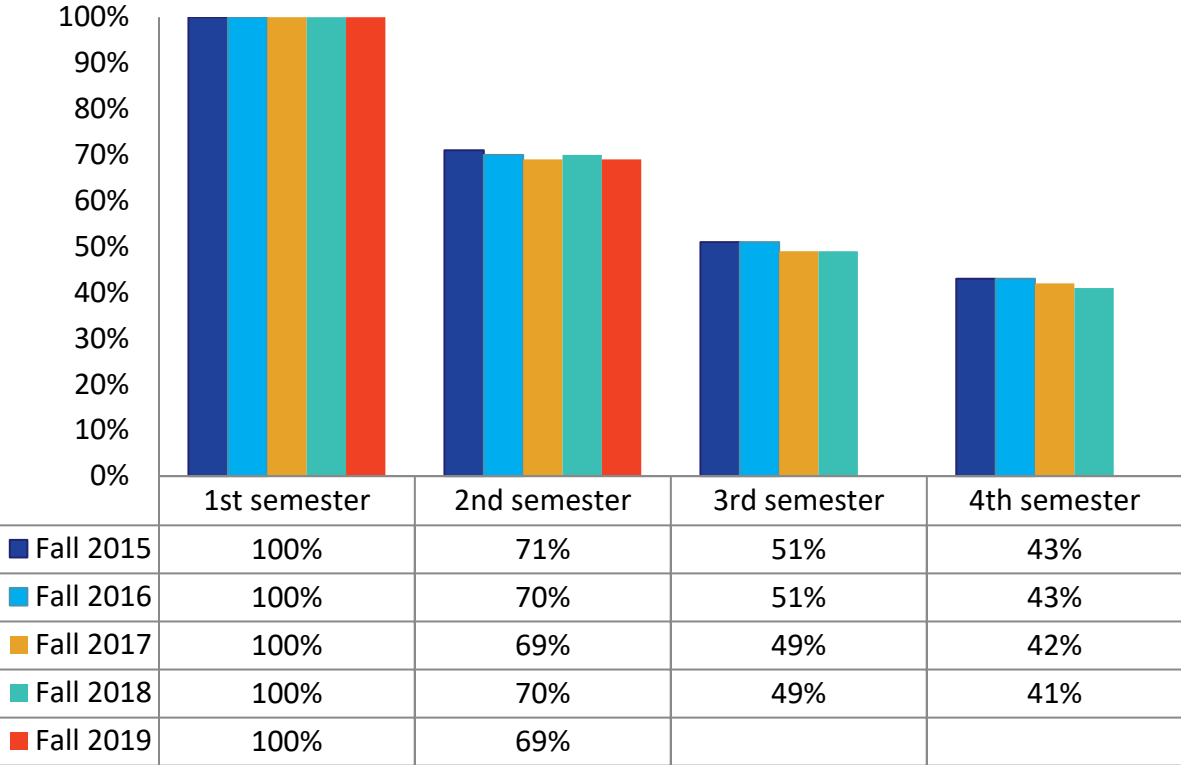
5 STUDENT OUTCOMES



Retention

Student retention refers to tracking the number of terms students continue to be enrolled in El Camino College. Retention rates are based on five fall cohorts over four semesters, looking only at fall and spring enrollment. For the overall fall cohorts, retention to 2nd, 3rd and 4th semesters have remained relatively unchanged over the last 5 years.

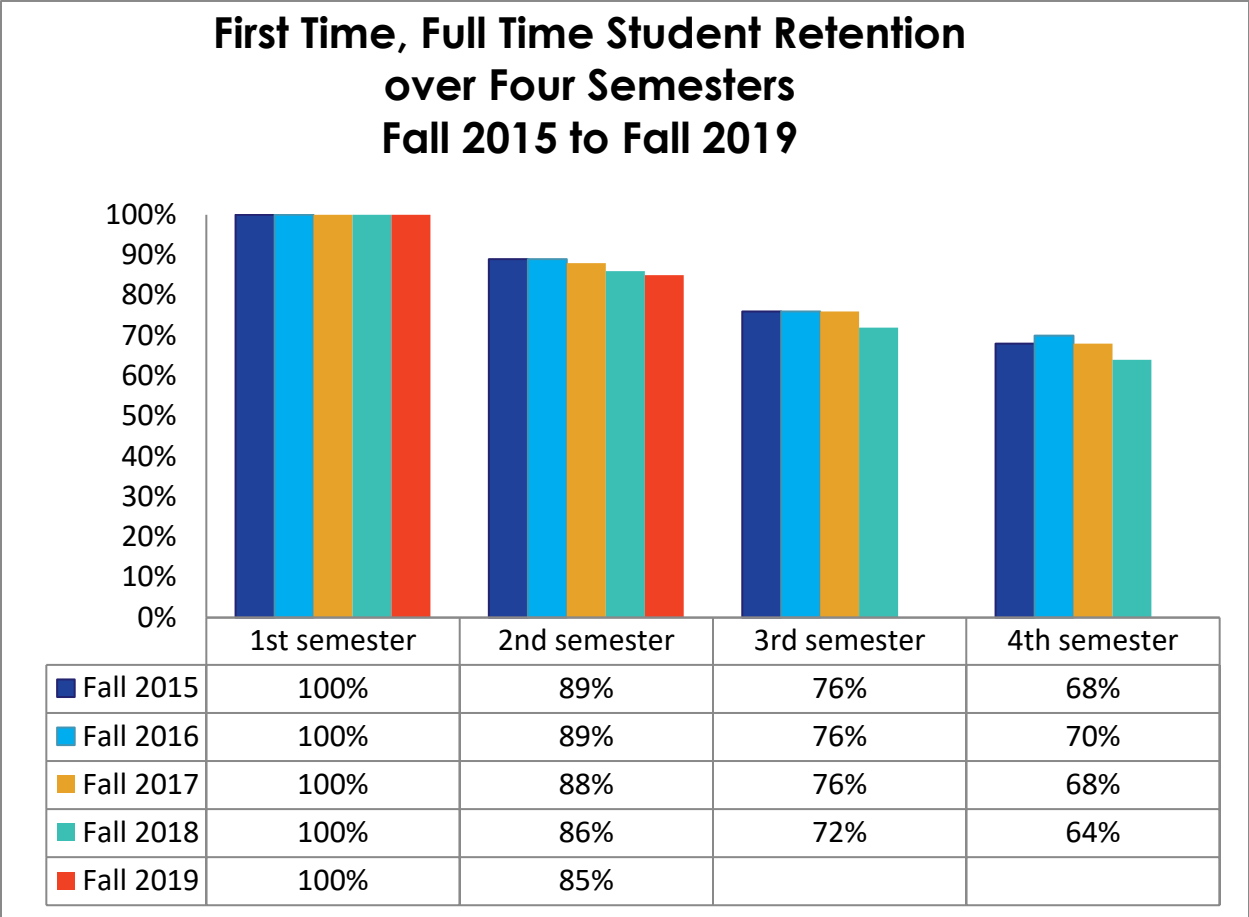
**Student Retention Over Four Semesters

Retention – First-Time Students

First-time, full-time cohort 2nd semester retention rate have decreased slightly from 89% in Fall 2015 to 85% in Fall 2019. First-time, full-time cohorts typically have a higher retention rate than overall fall cohorts.

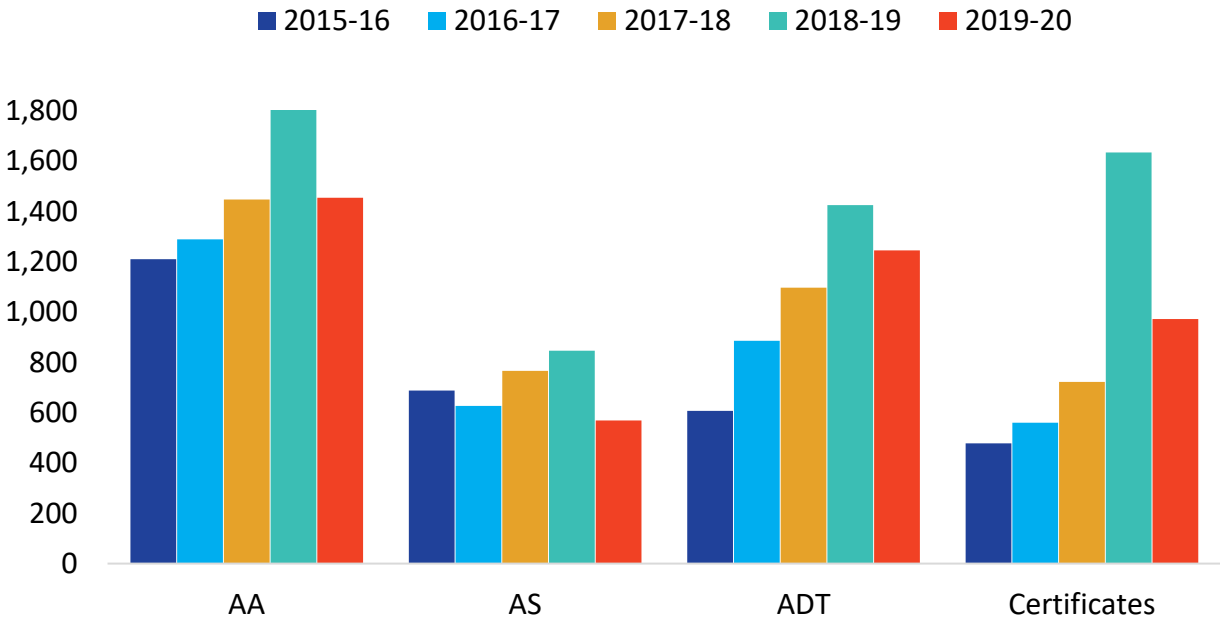
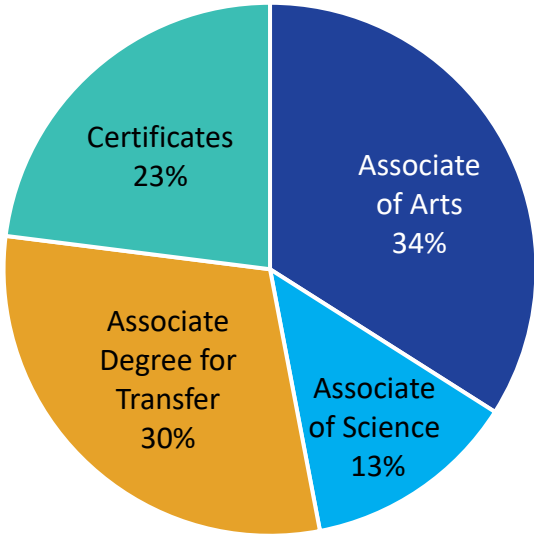

Degrees and Certificates

In the last 5 years, the number of degrees and certificates awarded have increased by 30%. From 2017-18 to 2018-19, the number of Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT) increased by 30%. During the same time period, the number of certificates awarded increased by over 120%. This is due to an increase in CSU and IGETC* certificates that were awarded in 2018-19.

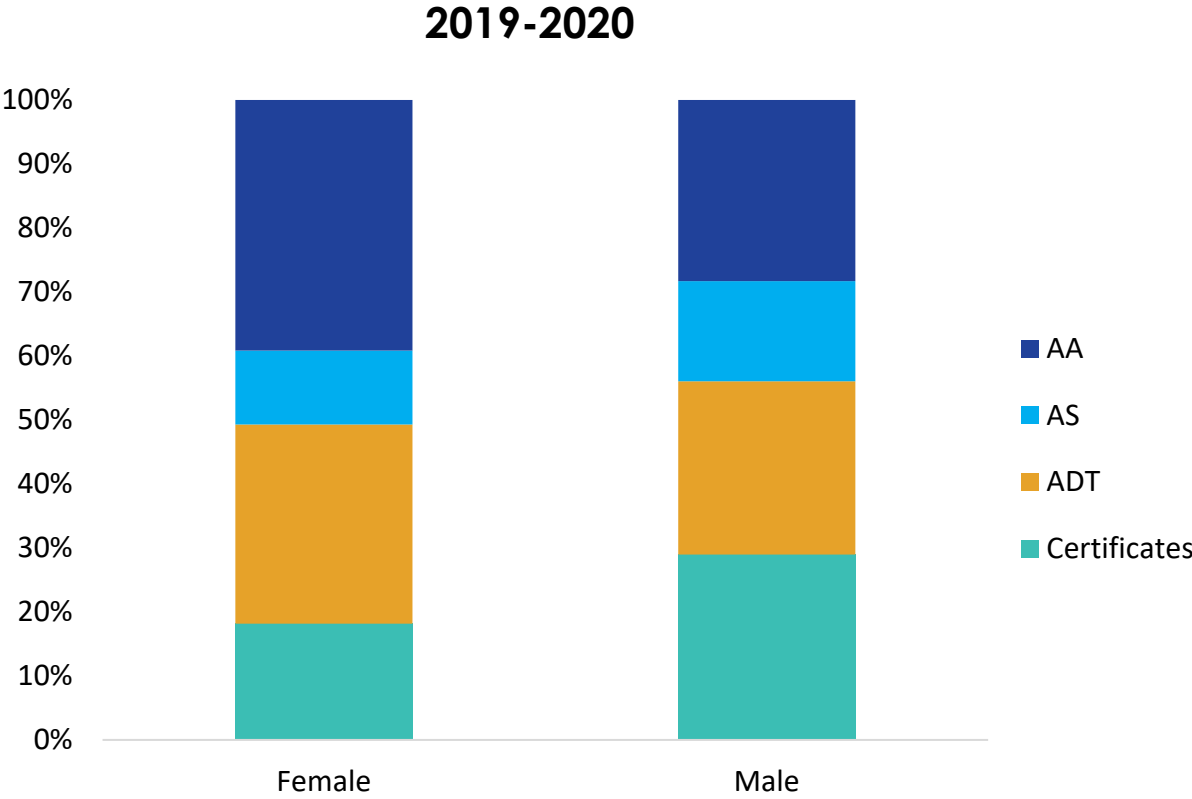

Sixty-six percent of Associate of Arts (AA) awardees were female while 55% of Certificate awardees were male in 2019-2020.

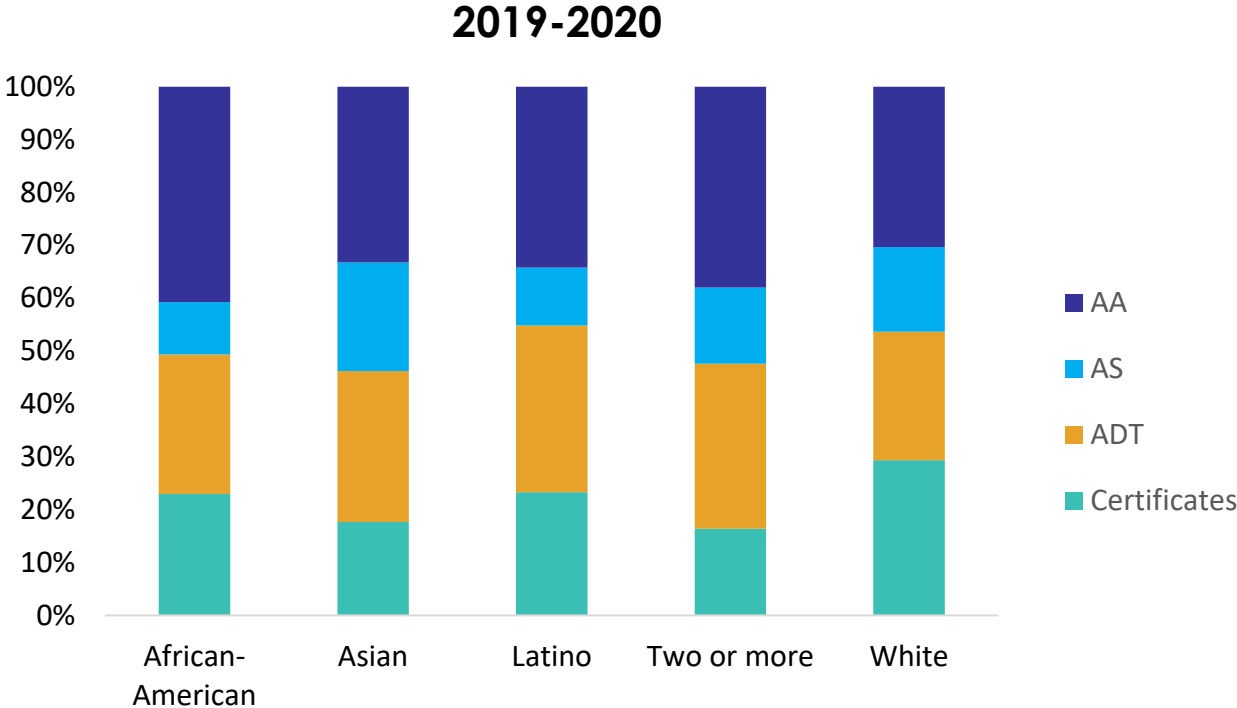

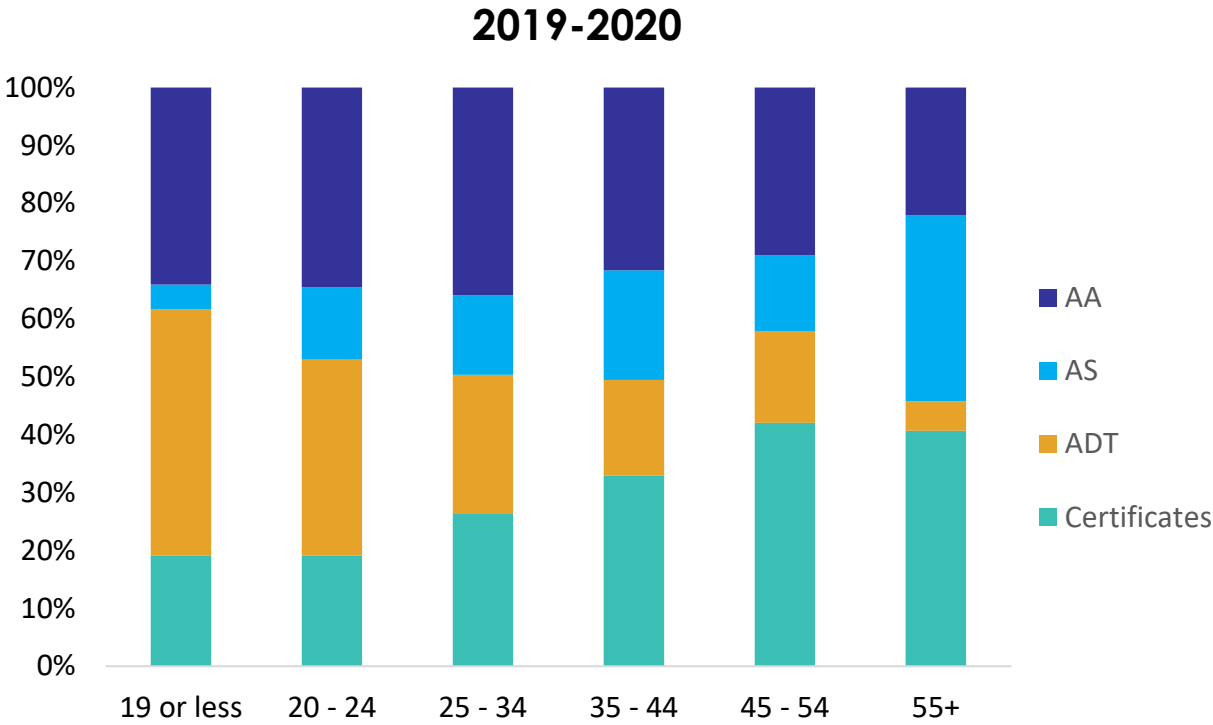

In Fall 2019, 52% of the El Camino College workforce are ages 35-44 and 45-54. Another 35% were ages 55 and older.

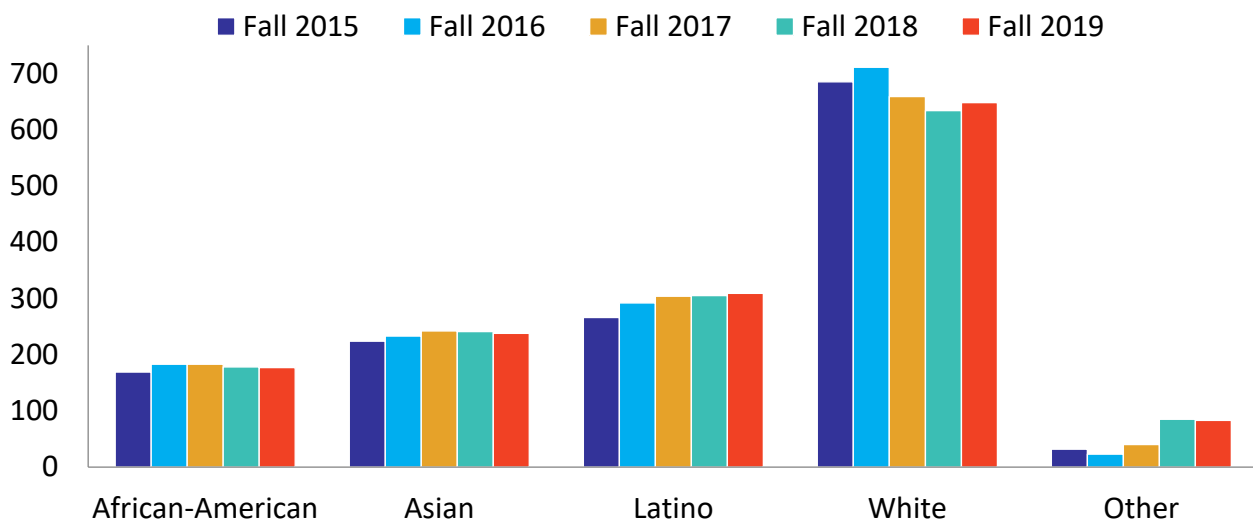
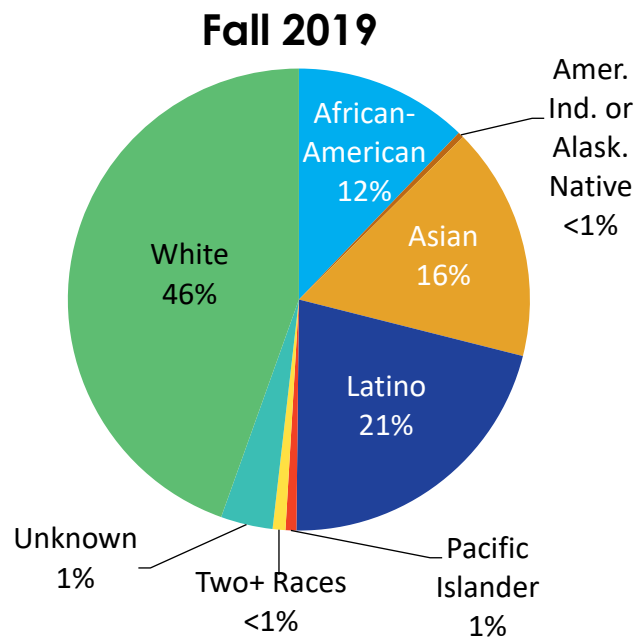

In Fall 2019, nearly half of the El Camino College workforce was White. In the last 5 years, there has been a steady increase in the number of Latinos employed by the College.



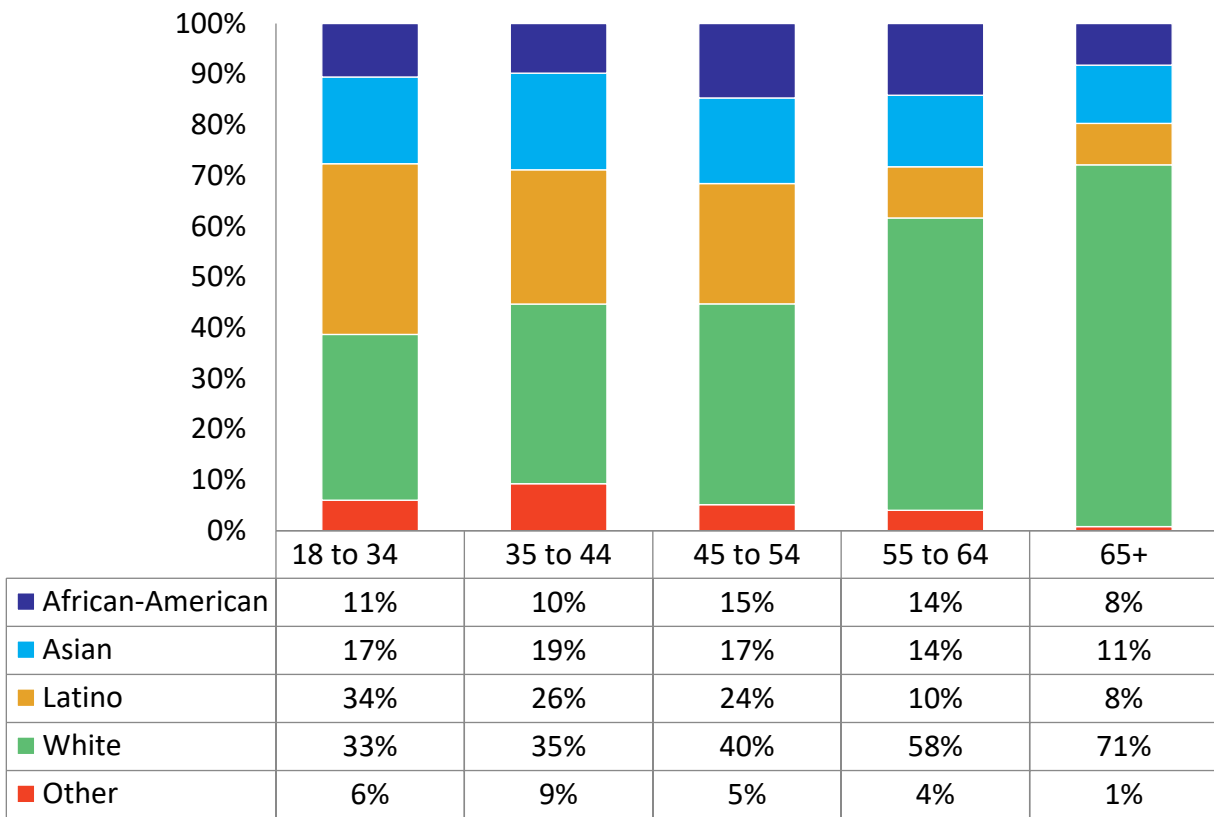

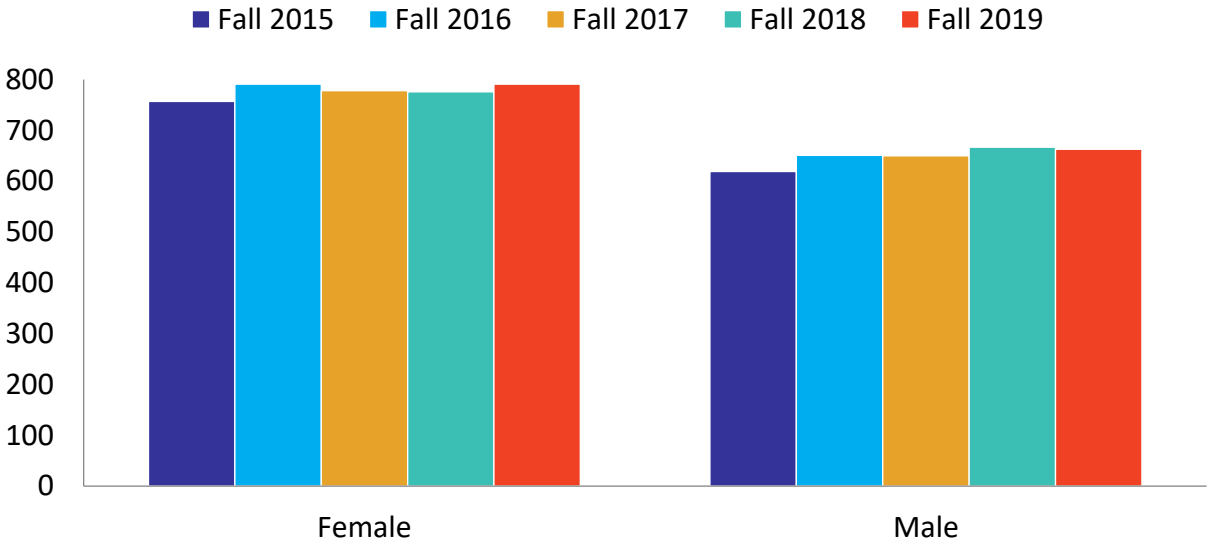
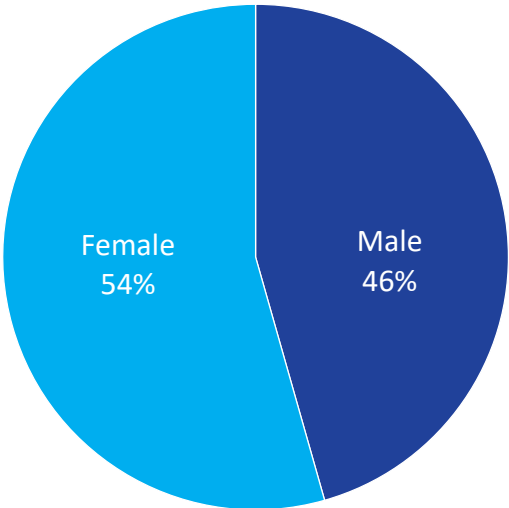

In Fall 2019, 54% of the El Camino College workforce was female. The number of female and male employees has been stable over the last 5 years.

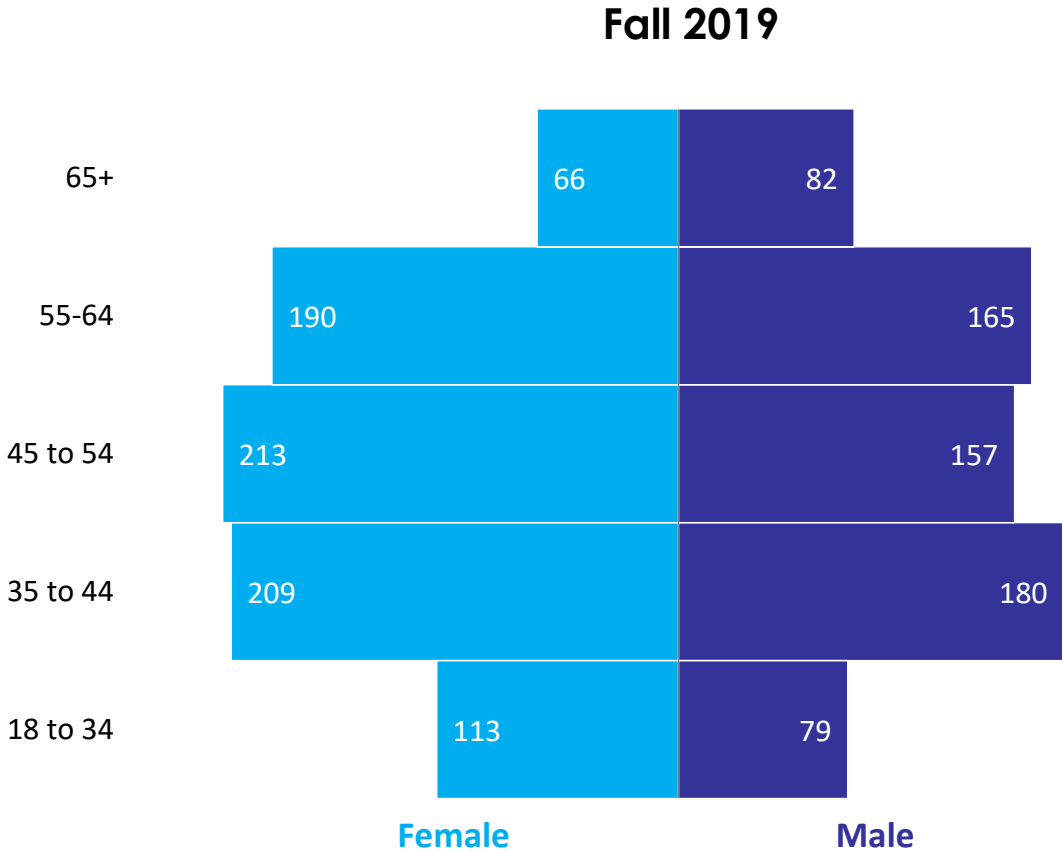

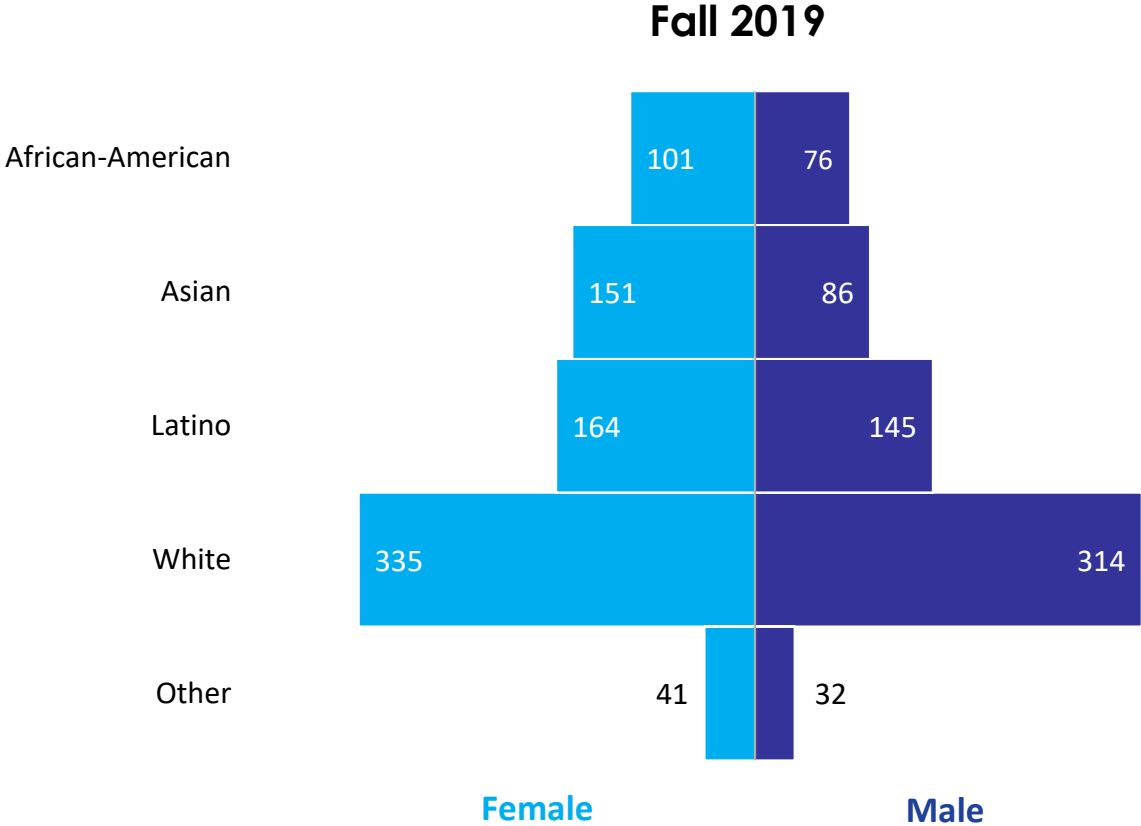
In Fall 2019, the largest gender differences were among ECC employees age 18-34 and age 45-54, with females comprising nearly 60% of these age groups.
