articulations while paying careful attention to the chords progression.

MUSI 103B -

Sing and aurally identify diatonic melodies, melodic triad patterns, four-part chorales including diatonic triads and dominant seventh chords in all inversions, and rhythms in simple and compound meters to the second subdivision of the beat that include syncopation, ties, and triplets and duplets.

Identify and perform music of the 18th century with emphasis on proper performance practices for ornamentation, phrasing, and dynamics.

Identify and correctly perform music in binary, ternary and rounded binary form.

Perform all 12 major and 12 minor scales, thirds, and arpeggios.

Perform advanced diatonic melodies in simple and compound meters.

Identify and perform terminology for tempi, dynamics, expression and form in a piece of music at an intermediate level.

Perform music with accuracy of pitch, rhythm, phrasing, dynamics, and articulation in music at an intermediate level.

Demonstrate principles of stage deportment in a music performance at an intermediate level.

Perform music with accuracy of notes, rhythms, and tempo in music of increasing difficulty.
