Define and describe terms relating to musical styles, such as Ars Antiqua, Ars Nova, and Italian Trecento. 5. Define terms relating to performance groups and instruments, such as troubadours, goliards, and consort. 6. Define terms relating to musical styles, forms, and genres. 7. Describe the careers and contributions of the most influential composers of early Western art music. 8. Compare and contrast genres of a similar type, such as opera and oratorio, sonata and sinfonia, madrigal and motet. 9. Describe and compare the characteristics of the main style periods of early Western art music in terms of instrumentation, texture, rhythm, melody, harmony, form, dynamics, and function 10. Identify by ear various instruments. 11. Identify by ear various approaches to melody such as: imitation, cantus firmus, and period structure. 12. Identify by ear various genres, such as mass, madrigal, opera, and sonata. 13. Identify by ear examples of music from the main style periods of early Western art music. 14. Identify by ear works by famous composers.

Medieval period: chant, liturgy and the mass; sacred and secular music; theory and practice; organum; Ars Nova; Italian Trecento; Notre Dame, English, and Burgundian schools; the music of the early and late Middle Ages (18 hours, lecture)</p> <p>II. The Renaissance: national styles; Netherlanders; age of Josquin; Italian and English madrigals; Reformation and Counter-Reformation; age of Palestrina; Venetian school; music for instruments (18 hours, lecture)</p> <p>III. The Baroque: early Italian opera; schools of opera; sacred music (Mass, Oratorio, Cantata, Passion); instrumental music; keyboard; dance forms and the suite; sonatas; sinfonias; concerto forms (18 hours, lecture)</p>

Typical Assignment Using Primary Method of Evaluation:	Write a report on an early Western art music concert. Include the name of the ensemble, the soloists, as well as the title of some pieces. Discuss the musical characteristics and form of the pieces heard and give personal opinions concerning the concert experience.
Critical Thinking Assignment 1:	In a written three to four page paper, compare and contrast the vocal music of the French Ars Nova and the Italian Trecento using corresponding features such as the musical forms, languages, instrumentation, notational values, poetic themes, and compositional process.
Critical Thinking Assignment 2:	Upon hearing an unidentified piece in class, name the performing instruments or voices, the structure of the theme, the style period it represents, and two or more musical features that identify its style period.
