Using a selected case study, students will need to identify at least two areas of culture that are related to gender and describe how they are interconnected. SLO #3 Gender as a Cultural Construction
	In a written assignment or objective exam students will demonstrate an understanding of gender as a cultural construction. Students will correctly define the term gender, and using selected case studies, they will describe the tremendous variation in the expectations for gender cross-culturally.
Course Objectives:	 Describe women's gender roles from a cross-cultural perspective that includes band, tribal, chiefdom and state level societies. Analyze women's socioeconomic and political status from a cross-cultural perspective including band, tribal, chiefdom and state level societies. Identify and analyze the changing socioeconomic, political and gender roles of women in diverse societies, including hunting and gathering groups, peasant and contemporary industrialized societies. Assess biological and cultural theories used to understand gender roles. Evaluate the cross-cultural representation of women in art and material culture from the Paleolithic to present day in various cultures of the world. Analyze the way in which notions of gender identity are learned through the process of enculturation in band, tribal and state level societies.
