Catalog Description:	<p>Through this honors course, students will explore the study of interpersonal communication methods and theories, emphasizing critical analysis of concepts like self-concept, perception, emotions, and conflict resolution within diverse social and cultural contexts. Students will engage with social and behavioral science research methods, examining issues historically and geographically, to understand the cultural and social frameworks that shape human behavior and appreciate the varied contributions of different genders, ethnicities, and societies, fostering a global and comparative perspective. This honors course is enriched through extensive reading, writing, and research assignments.</p> <p>Note: Students may take either Communication Studies 130 or Communication Studies 130H. Duplicate credit will not be awarded.</p>

Interpret the role of emotions in communication and develop emotional intelligence skills. 12. Construct arguments for the importance of active listening and empathy in relationship building. 13. Primary Method of Evaluation:	1) Substantial writing assignments
Typical Assignment Using Primary Method of Evaluation:	In a four- to six-page paper, list five elements of interpersonal communication such as (listening, language, identity, non-verbal, emotions, etc). With these five elements in mind, explain how they would affect interpersonal communication within and across different cultural, social, or gender groups. Use examples and sources to support claims.
Critical Thinking Assignment 1:	In a four- to six-page research paper, students will analyze how self-concept, perception, emotional expression, and conflict resolution influence interpersonal relationship dynamics. The paper should cite existing research and integrate course theories with real-world examples to understand these themes' impact on relationship development, quality, and influence of interpersonal communication in relationships.
Critical Thinking Assignment 2:	In a five- to seven-page research paper citing peer reviewed empirical research using qualitative or quantitative methods on interpersonal communication concepts and theories, students will explore interpersonal communication styles across distinct communities or cultures, focusing on at least four identified theories or elements of interpersonal communication. Through critical analysis, students will examine how these communication aspects impact interactions across different populations by identifying potential challenges, and proposing strategies for effective communication. This assignment will be enriched for the honors course by including the following items. 1. Students will develop a six- to eight-minute oral presentation with visuals that discusses their findings and suggest methods to improve interpersonal communication challenges that exist between different groups. 2. A 150 word scholarly journal style abstract that includes the background, relevant context, main argument(s), data, conclusions and contributions.
