Don't just tell me a story. Critical thinking allows you to research the topic and apply some pros and cons to the issue you choose.

	In a two-page paper, write as if you are working vice and enforcing prostitution violations. When arresting one of the women, she tells you an officer is getting favors from the prostitute by trading leniency for sex. What are your options? What are you going to do?
