In small groups of four to six students, write a one- to two-page script in which both sides of the issues are debated. Each group will enact the scripted debate in front of the class.

- V. COLLEGE-LEVEL CRITICAL THINKING ASSIGNMENTS

 Cite a minimum of two specific assignments that demonstrate collegelevel critical thinking. (Required for degree applicable courses

 - 1. In small groups of four to six students, analyze three case studies on abuse reporting. The case scenarios describe child abuse, elder abuse, and domestic violence. Assess each scenario, formulate interventions and evaluate possible outcomes. Compare and contrast the reporting laws for each type of abuse. This includes the time limit for reporting abuse and identifying the responsible agency. A speaker from each group will present the group's analysis of the case studies to the class.
 - 2. Analyze a clinical dilemma by utilizing ethical theories. For example, you suspect a colleague, who is a respected employee at your facility, is stealing narcotics. Should you immediately report your suspicion to the nursing supervisor, or should you first discuss it with the colleague? In a two-page written report, compare and contrast how a deontologist would approach the problem as compared to a teleologist.
