1. In French, spend one to two minutes discussing with a classmate the differences between the traditional French family and the traditional American family. For you, which is the better structure and why? Be prepared to share orally your conclusions with the instructor or with the class.

2. In French, orally discuss for one to two minutes with a classmate a trip to a restaurant. Discuss your favorite restaurant and your favorite foods.
