Explain the cultural significance of these architectural elements and how they compare to other Italian cathedrals of the Renaissance, or to other forms of Italian art.
Critical Thinking	Using a variety of sources (literary and historical texts, short stories, selections from
	cultural readers, and periodicals) research a topic discussed in class such as Italian

	education, family life, culture, or visual arts, and prepare a ten-minute oral presentation in English on your findings.
Critical Thinking Assignment 2:	In a two- to four-page essay written in English, evaluate a contemporary Italian movie. Include in the evaluation a list of major characters, and explain how each character illustrates contemporary Italian society.
