- 5. Organize information into the lead block, nut graph, body, and conclusion style of magazine journalism.
- 6. Rewrite and design articles so that they comply with the rules of professional journalism.
- 7. Work with photographers and artists to determine the best way journalistically to illustrate a magazine article both online and in print.
- 8. Demonstrate ability and skill as a journalist by participating in various journalism competitions, such as the Journalism Association of Community Colleges (JACC) regional and state conferences.
