B. TYPICAL ASSIGNMENT USING PRIMARY METHOD OF EVALUATION:

Prepare a five- to ten-minute presentation in which you will discuss the process of your research. Include the following: the search topic you formulated; the search strategies you selected; and search engines you employed. Explain why you chose the relevant sites and provide a critique/evaluation of the selected sites.

C. COLLEGE-LEVEL CRITICAL THINKING ASSIGNMENTS:

1. In a two-page essay, describe the process you employed to survey the Internet resources available on the history of the Selma riots and their role in the Civil Rights Movement. Explain the reasoning involved in your choice of search tools; describe how different search strategies and terms provide different results; and identify which strategy and terms were the most effective.
2. Select a current controversial topic, such as gun control, euthanasia, or bilingual education, and find 3 to 4 Internet sites that support and/or refute the topic. In a two-page written paper, evaluate these sites for their accuracy and validity for a college-level research paper.
