These advanced courses will be added to the existing program. All of the labs will be conducted at clinical sites currently used by the program.

Topics include high frequency oscillatory ventilation; high frequency jet ventilation; Vapotherm; SiPAP; and T-Piece Resuscitation. The indications, contraindications, and appropriate delivery will be discussed and reviewed for multiple patient populations.

4. Respiratory Care 292 – Advanced Clinical Application and Interpretation of Blood Gases

Units: 2 Lecture: 2 hours Lab: 0 hours Faculty Load: 13.334% Enrollment Limitation: Students must be admitted to the El Camino College Respiratory Care Program or be graduated from an accredited respiratory care program

Credit, degree applicable; Letter Grade

This course provides instruction in respiratory clinical application of blood gases. Topics include the fundamentals of acid-base and respiratory physiology; assessment and interpretation of blood gas values; blood gas values applied to patient care; validation of results with other modalities; and appropriate methods to collect, analyze, and report blood gas results.

5. Respiratory Care 293 – Cardiac Monitoring in Advanced Respiratory Care Units: 4 Lecture: 3 hours Lab: 3 hours Faculty Load: 35.001% Enrollment Limitation: Students must be admitted to the El Camino College Respiratory Care Program or be graduated from an accredited respiratory care program

Credit, degree applicable; Letter Grade

This course provides instruction in cardiac monitoring associated with advanced respiratory care. Topics include twelve-lead Electrocardiogram interpretation; central venous pressure; Pulmonary Artery Pressure; Cardiac Index; usage of pressure transducers, pulmonary and arterial catheters as well as treatment of cardiac conditions using electrolytes, cardiac medications and diuretics. Laboratory experiments and clinical visitation will be used to complement the didactic instruction.

6. Respiratory Care 294 – Pulmonary Function Testing in Advanced Respiratory Care

Units: 4 Lecture: 3 hours Lab: 3 hours Faculty Load: 35.001% Enrollment Limitation: Students must be admitted to the El Camino College Respiratory Care Program or be graduated from an accredited respiratory care program

Credit, degree applicable; Letter Grade

This course provides instruction in pulmonary function testing associated with advanced respiratory care. Topics include metabolic measurements using indirect calorimetry; pediatric pulmonary function testing; cardiopulmonary exercise testing; sleep studies; and bronchoscopy. Laboratory experiments and clinical visitation will be used to complement didactic instruction.

7. Respiratory Care 295 – Pharmacology in Advanced Respiratory Care
Units: 3 Lecture: 3 hours Lab: 0 hours Faculty Load: 20.001%
Enrollment Limitation: Students must be admitted to the El Camino College
Respiratory Care Program or be graduated from an accredited respiratory care
program

Credit, degree applicable; Letter Grade

This course provides instruction in pharmacology associated with advanced respiratory care. Topics include current trends in respiratory pharmacology; the use of sedatives, analgesics, antibiotics, and paralytic agents in various delivery forms during advanced therapeutic modalities; as well as other pharmacological agents used during specialized testing regimens.

8. Respiratory Care 296 – Physical Examination in Advanced Respiratory Care Units: 4 Lecture: 3 hours Lab: 3 hours Faculty Load: 35.001% Enrollment Limitation: Students must be admitted to the El Camino College Respiratory Care Program or be graduated from an accredited respiratory care program

Credit, degree applicable; Letter Grade

This course provides instruction in physical examination associated with advanced respiratory care. Topics include physical assessment; collection of lab data; the interview process; and current imaging studies.

9. Respiratory Care 297 – Perinatal and Pediatric Care in Advanced Respiratory Care Units: 4 Lecture: 3 hours Lab: 3 hours Faculty Load: 35.001% Enrollment Limitation: Students must be admitted to the El Camino College Respiratory Care Program or be graduated from an accredited respiratory care program

Credit, degree applicable; Letter Grade

This course provides instruction in perinatalogy and pediatrics associated with advanced respiratory care. Topics include respiratory care monitoring;

diagnostics; advanced concepts in emergency procedures; and current topics in perinatal and pediatric respiratory care. Laboratory experiments and clinical visitation will be used to complement lectures.

10. Respiratory Care 298 – Advanced Emergency Management

Units: 3 Lecture: 2 hours Lab: 3 hours TBA Faculty Load: 28.334% Enrollment Limitation: Students must be admitted to the El Camino College Respiratory Care Program or be graduated from an accredited respiratory care program

Credit, degree applicable; Letter Grade

This course provides instruction on the role of the respiratory therapist during disaster management. Topics include intra-hospital transport; land and air transport; rapid response teams; distinguishing the various color codes within a hospital; disaster preparedness at the federal, state, and local levels; and the requirements for disaster preparedness within the hospital.

The programs and curricula of the District shall be of high quality, relevant to community and student needs, and evaluated regularly to ensure quality and currency. To that end, the Superintendent/President shall establish procedures for the development and review of all curricular offerings, including their establishment, modification or discontinuance.

The Superintendent/President delegates to the Vice President of Academic Affairs the development of procedures to initiate and review curriculum and program development. These procedures are developed jointly by the Academic Senate and the Vice President of Academic Affairs. The procedures are located in the College Curriculum Handbook.

These procedures shall include:

- involvement of the faculty and the Academic Senate in creating, updating, and reviewing courses, establishing prerequisites, and placing courses within disciplines; regular review and justification of programs tied to the program review process;
- 2. opportunities for training for persons involved in curriculum development; and
- 3. consideration of job market and other related information for vocational and occupational programs.

All new programs and all program deletions shall be approved by the Board.

All new programs shall be submitted to the Office of the Chancellor for the California Community Colleges for approval as required.

## **BP 4100** Graduation Requirements for Degrees and Certificates

The District grants the degrees of Associate in Arts and Associate in Science to those students who have completed the subject requirements for graduation and who have maintained a 2.0 grade point average in subjects attempted. Students must also complete the general education residency and competency requirements set forth in Title 5 regulations.

Students may be awarded Certificates of Achievement upon successful completion of a minimum of 18 or more semester units of degree-applicable coursework designed as a pattern of learning experiences designed to develop certain capabilities that may be related to career or general education.

The Superintendent/President shall establish procedures to determine degree and certificate requirements that include appropriate involvement of the College Curriculum Committee. The procedures shall assure that graduation requirements are published in the College Catalog and included in other resources that are convenient for students.

Education Code Section 70902(b)(3); Title 5, Sections 55060 et seq.

## **AP 4100** Graduation Requirements for Degrees and Certificates

- 1) Graduation requirements for degrees include:
  - a) Satisfactory completion of at least 60 semester units of college work. "College work" is defined as courses acceptable toward the associate degree including those that have been properly approved pursuant to Title 5, Section 55002(a) at a California Community College.
    - (i) Courses taken at a California Community College may be used to satisfy general education and/or major requirements.
    - (ii) If the course is offered at El Camino College, but the originating California Community College uses it in a different area than El Camino College, the course will be used in the area that benefits the student.
    - (iii) If the course is not offered at El Camino College, the college will honor the course in the same general education area in which the originating California Community College places the course.
    - (iv) Courses taken at other than a California Community College may satisfy general education and/or major requirements if the institution is accredited by one of the regional accrediting associations and the scope and rigor of the course meets the guidelines set forth by the college.
    - (v) If there is doubt of the reasonable application, the course(s) must be approved by the discipline faculty and/or the dean of the division in which the course(s) in question would normally be placed.
  - b) Completion of at least 18 semester units in general education and at least 18 semester units in which a grade of C or better has been earned in a major listed in the Community Colleges' "Taxonomy of Programs." Catalog rights do apply; see Board Policy 4100.1. The general education requirements must include a minimum number of units as specified in the college catalog in the natural sciences, social and behavioral sciences, humanities, and language and rationality. Ethnic studies must be integrated within general education offerings.
  - c) Completion of at least 12 semester units of study in residence within requirements for either the general education and/or major.
  - d) Demonstrated competence in reading, written expression, and mathematics.
- 2) Students may receive credit for knowledge or skills to be counted toward satisfaction of the requirements for an associate degree as defined in Policy 4235 Credit by Exam. Advanced Placement Exams with a score of 3, 4, or 5 may be used toward general education as approved by the Academic Senate for California

Community Colleges document entitled "Standardized Template for Advanced Placement Examination Information." Credit may be used towards specific courses as determined by the faculty and listed in the college catalog.

- 3) District policies and procedures regarding general education and degree requirements are published in the college catalog and are filed with the State Chancellor's Office.
- 4) Requirements for Certificates of Achievement include:
  - a) Successful completion of a course of study or curriculum that consists of 18 or more semester units of degree-applicable credit coursework. The certificate of achievement shall be designed to demonstrate that the student has completed coursework and developed capabilities relating to career or general education.
  - b) Content and assessment standards that ensure the certificate programs are consistent with the mission of the District.
  - c) Shorter credit programs that lead to a certificate may be established by the District. Certificates for which the State Chancellor's approval is not sought may be given any name or designation deemed appropriate except for certificate of achievement, certificate of completion, or certificate of competency.
- 5) Students qualifying for more than one AA or AS degree will have all degrees posted on their transcripts; however, they will only receive one diploma for an achieved AA degree and one diploma for an achieved AS degree.
- 6) Students qualifying for more than one certificate of achievement will receive the certificates and have them posted on their transcripts.
