



Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee Annual Report 2019-20



Executive Summary

The El Camino Community College District (ECCCD) was successful at the November 5, 2002 election in obtaining authorization from the district's voters to issue \$394 million in general obligation bonds. District voters also gave the ECCCD authorization following the November 5, 2012 election to issue \$350 million in general obligation bonds.

The elections were each conducted under Proposition 39. Pursuant to Section 15278 of the Education Code, the ECCCD established an oversight committee to satisfy the accountability requirements of Prop 39. In March 2013, the El Camino Community College District Board of Trustees confirmed that the Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee initially established for the 2002 Measure shall have the duties and rights set forth in the committee's bylaws with oversight responsibility over both 2002 Measure E and 2012 Measure E.

The charter of the El Camino Community College District Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee is to inform the public concerning bond revenue expenditures and to actively review and report on the expenditure of these funds. The El Camino Community College District's committee comprises a cross section of the citizenry who have volunteered their time to represent various constituencies, and fulfill the responsibilities listed above.

During the 2019-20 fiscal year, the committee met on a regular basis; reviewing expenditures, touring campus renovations, asking questions, and expressing observations and recommendations. This Annual Report of the El Camino Community College District Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee documents the results of these activities and serves to fulfill the basic tenets of the charter.

By law, the Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee membership is comprised of at least seven members who are selected from different groups in the local community. The committee consists of a representative that is active in a business organization located within the district, a member active in a senior citizens organization, a student enrolled at the college, an active member from a the taxpayer's organization and a member in an organization that supports the college (i.e. member of an advisory council or Foundation).

Accompanying this report and available on the ECC website are the agendas and minutes of the open public meetings, as well as the independent audit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020 performed by the firm of Clifton Larson Allen. The committee examined and reviewed this audit. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020, the District complied with the requirements of Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution.

Lou Bahar is a Manhattan Beach resident, Foundation donor, scholarship supporter and ECC alumna. She started her business career at ECC with Intro to Business, Business Law and Basic Accounting. She loved accounting so much she transferred to CSULB to complete her four-year degree and received a bachelor's degree in accounting. She went on to work in various accounting jobs; finally working for her husband's floor covering distribution company before retiring. She is still a student at ECC and a lifelong learner! Born in Chicago, she happily moved to Los Angeles in her early 20s. Ms. Bahar lived in Redondo Beach for about 10 years and then moved to Manhattan Beach in 1980 and has lived there ever since.

David Kartsonis is a longtime South Bay resident who began his higher education at El Camino College at the age of 13. After graduating at 16, he transferred to UC Santa Barbara with a Regents Scholarship and earned a bachelor's degree in creative studies. Mr. Kartsonis is president of the El Camino College Foundation Board of Directors, and has served on the board since 2009. She has served on the Finance and Investment Committees of the UCLA Foundation, scholarship committees of the UCLA Alumni Association, and has chaired various public school and athletic team endeavors in the South Bay. Currently Ms. McCarthy is a member of the El Camino College Foundation Board and serves on the finance committee. Ms. McCarthy is a life-long learner who is currently studying French and Art History at El Camino College. She and her family have resided in Manhattan Beach for over thirty years.

Dr. Don Brann has over 25 years of experience in education, most recently through his leadership of the Wiseburn Unified School District. He has served as a school Superintendent in six districts, and founded the Da Vinci Schools in the Wiseburn District in 2008. He has led four successful bond initiatives over his extensive experience as an educator. A resident of El Segundo, Dr. Brann is currently serving as a member of the El Segundo City Council. Dr. Brann earned a BS in Business and an Ed.D. in Education at the University of Southern California. He is a graduate of El Camino College, was recognized as an ECC Distinguished Alumni, and is a member of the El Camino College Foundation President's Circle.

Gino DiGregorio is a Managing Director at Accenture, a global professional services firm committed to helping organizations transform in ways that change how the world works and lives. He received his MBA from the University of Chicago Booth School of Business, and a BS in Engineering Science from Trinity University in San Antonio, TX. He works as a client account lead for global financial services clients. Mr. DiGregorio has been a member of the El Camino College Foundation Board since 2016 and is on the board for Back on My Feet Los Angeles.

Jess Negrete is the principal engineer at J.M. Negrete & Associates, a structural and civil engineering firm based in Torrance. The firm also specializes in building code consultation, structural inspection, architectural design, land surveys, and subdivision engineering. He serves as a director-at-large for the North Torrance Homeowners' Association. He also serves on the Citizens Advisory Panel of the Torrance Refining Company and on the Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee of the Torrance Unified School District. Mr. Negrete is a graduate of El Camino College. He also earned a bachelor's degree in civil engineering from California State University, Long Beach.

Chris Taylor is Director of System Engineering at Northrop Grumman Aerospace Systems. Mr. Taylor has 18 years of technical, operations, and program management experience in the Space Systems. Mr. Taylor attended Tuskegee University graduated with a Bachelor's Degree in Electrical Engineering and earned a Master's of Science in Electrical Engineering from University of California Berkeley. Chris has served a volunteer help to develop a STEM program at the Boys and Girls Club in Lomita. Chris has supported recruiting efforts, at UCLA, UC Berkeley, national diversity conferences. Chris is member of Wiseburn's Juan Cabrillo PTA, Site School Council.

Lindsey Lee is a resident of Torrance, growing up within the community all her life. She currently serves as the Student Trustee on the El Camino College Board of Trustees and as an Executive Member for the Associated Students' Organization. She is also a member of Rotaract of South Bay, volunteering over 600 hours for Rotary District 5280, reading books to children, beautifying elementary schools and community gardens, and fundraising money to eradicate polio. July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020

During the 18th year of El Camino College's bond-funded building program, the college completed several substantial projects, and continued to design and build others.

Milestones:

- Student Services Center: The departments in the new building include: Admissions & Records, International Student Program, Veterans Services, Warrior Welcome Center, EOPS/ CARE/CalWORKs & Guardian Scholars, Career & Transfer Center, Counseling & Student Success, Enrollment Services, Financial Aid, First Year Experience, Outreach & School Relations, Dual Enrollment, Special Resource Center, KEAS, Student Equity and Achievement, Student Support Services, and the Language Academy. The Student Services Center substantial completion was achieved August 2019 and the building is occupied.
- New Gymnasium Building Project: This is the first project identified in the 2012 Facilities Master Plan. The new building houses the basketball, volleyball, and other indoor sports programs. Substantial completion was achieved on November 2019 for District use and the building is occupied.
- Construction continues on the Pool and Classroom Building Project. This building will consist of two pools (a competition pool and an adaptive pool), a weight room and classrooms. Instructors, coaches and the division offices will be housed in this complex. Substantial completion was achieved on December 2020.
- Construction continues on the Administration Building Project. The construction of the new building will be on the same site as the current building. The offices of the Superintendent/President, the Vice President of Academic Affairs, the Vice President of Student Services, the Vice President of Administrative Services, the Vice President of Human Resources and the Human Resources staff, Institutional Research and Planning, Marketing and Communication, Foundation, Scholarship, and Grants, will all be housed here. Also included within this building is new Board meeting room and flexible conference rooms. The project has been completed and is occupied.
- Manhattan Café Project. New interior construction of a 1,658 SF café at the 1st level on the northeast corner of the existing Bookstore Building. We have obtained Division State Architect approval. The next step is to go out to bid.
- The Art Complex building design has been submitted to the State for construction approval. Programs within the building will consist of 2D and 3D art classrooms, sculpture, jewelry design, digital design classes, film video, photography and print making. The complex will include the anthropology museum, art gallery and staff offices as well. Exterior gathering and instruction areas will be abundant within the large shared quad with the Social and Behavioral Sciences Building. Anticipated Construction Start: Winter 2020.
- The Behavioral Social Sciences building received plan check approval by the Division of State Architect in December 2019. In addition to the Division office, the departments in the new building include American Studies, Anthropology, Child Development/Education, Economics, Ethnic Studies, History, Human Development, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology, Social Justice Studies, Sociology, and Women's Studies. Anticipated Construction Start: Winter 2020.

- The Central Plant Retro-Commissioning Project started in November 2019 and includes updating the air conditioning systems in 17 buildings by installing smart energy valves. A new chiller, cooling tower and water treatment system will be installed in the Central Plant. The project will provide better energy management and will significantly reduce the operating cost of the Central Plant. Project completion by February 2021.
- The Existing Student Activities & Student Services Demolition Project got underway in December 2019 and is scheduled for completion by the end of June 2020. The project is taking advantage of recycling the concrete for compacted fill, significantly reducing the volume.
- Student Activities Relocation Project consists of converting the first floor of the Communications Building. The project will convert the first floor of the Communications Building into the Student Activities Center consisting of 7,923 square feet. The project includes student activities area, department offices, dedicated ASO and ICC spaces, conference rooms, break room and student club storage. We received Division State Architect approval of the plans. The next step is to go out to bid.
- Construction Technology project is a covered 4 bay outdoor instruction area consisting of 10,500 sq. ft. which will be large enough to allow full scale building structures to be built under it. The canopy structure will be lighted and protected from the rain allowing for greater instruction scheduling flexibility. The canopy structure will have adequate electric, water and compressed air to support the attending students. Exterior asphalt paving will be provided for fire department access and to facilitate large deliveries of supplies. We received Division State Architect approval of the plans. The next step is to go out to bid.


Challenges:


2012 Authorization General Obligation Bond Fund Categories and Projects

2012 Authorization General Obligation Bond Fund Expenditures Year 2019-20 (by Type)




2012 Authorization General Obligation Bond Fund Expenditures Year 2019-20 (by Category)




2002 & 2012 Authorization Combined General Obligation Bond Fund Categories and Projects
