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Executive Summary

The charter of the El Camino College Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee is to inform the public concerning bond revenue expenditures and to actively "review and report" on the expenditure of these funds. Our committee comprises a cross section of the citizenry who have volunteered their time to represent various constituencies, and fulfill the responsibilities listed above.

During this fourth year of existence, our committee has met on a regular basis; reviewing expenditures, touring campus renovations, asking questions, and expressing our concerns and recommendations. This Annual Report of the El Camino College Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee documents the results of these activities and serves to fulfill the basic tenets of our charter.

Within this report are the agendas and minutes of our open public meetings, as well as the independent audit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, performed by the firm of Vicenti Lloyd & Stutzman LLP. Our committee examined and reviewed this audit, the results of which are contained herein.

Leandro Carde, an Inglewood businessman, represents the area business community for the committee. He is also a member of the Lawndale Rotary Club, the American Legion, the National Association of Realtors, the California Association of Realtors, and the Inglewood Apartment Owners Association. He is a graduate of El Camino College.

Lou Garcia, a Redondo Beach resident, is the former city manager of Redondo Beach. In addition to serving in several management positions in a variety of cities across California, he also ran his own consulting firm. Mr. Garcia is also a member of the El Camino College Foundation Board. He has a master's degree in public administration and a bachelor's degree in police science and administration, both from California State University, Los Angeles. He is a member of his Homeowner's Association and serves as a taxpayer association representative.

Judith Gibson, of Torrance, is a member of the Torrance Planning Commission and a founding member of the Torrance Education Foundation. She will serve on the oversight committee as the representative for Trustee Area 5. Ms. Gibson is also a member of the Torrance Unified School District Facilities Ad Hoc Committee, and is a 17-year PTA member. In the community, she has been a Parks and Recreation Commissioner, and a Community Services Commissioner, among many other leadership positions.

Robert Hammond, of Manhattan Beach, is a retired financial manager and serves as an at-large member of the committee. Hammond has also been a student at El Camino College for two years, taking 32 units of science and math courses.

As a school board member, he oversaw \$65 million in modernization and new construction to district facilities, and served as board liaison to the facilities, oversight, and construction steering committees.

Year Four Commentary

July 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006

During the fourth year of El Camino College's facilities master plan work, the college completed one project and began construction on several others. Funding for this work has come from funds provided in the 2003 Series A issuance. In addition El Camino College refinanced Series A which provided \$6,866,756 of additional funding. In addition, \$1,956,633 of interest income was earned on unspent funds.

Milestones:

- Completed work on the Science Complex Renovation project
- Board approved significant changes to Facilities Master Plan in February 2005 in order to begin addressing significant increase in construction costs
- Entered into a contract with contractor for Phase 1 electrical infrastructure work
- Awarded bids for modular site infrastructure and modular classrooms
- Awarded bids and began work on Humanities building construction
- Awarded contract to Maas to provide services to college, including program management, construction management, and state funding acquisition
- Entered into a contract for design and engineering of the Bookstore/Cafeteria
- Committee amended by-laws to bring into line with current practices and legal issues
- Board passed resolution 2006-1 to authorize sale of an additional NTE \$150,000,000 in Measure E bonds

Challenges:


- Construction inflation is increasing at the rate of anywhere from 12% to 24% per year. This has
 already been reflected in construction awards to date and is expected to continue in the coming
 years. Without the securing of additional funds the college will need to either eliminate projects
 in their entirety or severely reduce projects. While the college has already made several
 modifications more work needs to be done.
- Department of State Architect (DSA) approval delays are impacting the master plan budget. With the substantial increase in construction costs this delay is an added factor in the increase in actual bid awards versus budgets. These delays are causing, and will continue to cause, the original master plan to fall behind schedule.
- The original Master Plan called for the use of campus center fees to help fund the cost of the new Student Services Building. This can only be accomplished with a positive election vote of the students. Since this is unlikely the District will address these funding needs by other means.
- The college has reformatted the monthly project list of expenditures to provide more detail of
 actual committed expenditures in order to allow for closer monitoring of budget versus actual
 costs. The college will need to continue this process as the construction market and specific
 projects develop.
- It is the strong feeling of the committee that El Camino College needs to immediately begin the process of educating the public on the current construction environment and the difficult decisions they will face in order to complete the facilities master plan.
- The facilities master plan outlined by the college is a very extensive and involved undertaking. The college has retained several highly qualified project and construction managers to oversee

- the work. However, it is critical that the college continue to closely monitor both the work of these consultants and the overall project in order to be certain the substantial funds are being properly spent.
- The committee has in the past received and reviewed both an independent certified Performance Audit and Financial Audit, both required by state law. The past two years the committee received a Performance Audit and the Board of Trustees received a Financial Audit. The Financial Audit is available on the El Camino College Web Site http://www.elcamino.edu/administration/bond/.
- Proposition 39 requires a minimum number of oversight committee members (seven) as well as specific affiliations of the members in order to guarantee a cross-section of the community is represented. It is critical that the board of education and administration monitor the membership make-up to assure on-going compliance with state law.









The Continuing Disclosure Certificate is executed and delivered by the El Camino Community College District in connection with issuance of \$63,700,000 General Obligation Bonds, Election of 2002, Series 2003A.

The Bonds are issued pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County adopted on February 11, 2003. The District Resolution and the County Resolution are heretofore referred to as the Resolution.

We have examined the El Camino Community College District's compliance with the performance requirements for the Proposition 39/Measure E General Obligation Bonds for the period ended June 30, 2006, under the applicable provisions of Section 1(b)(3)(C) of Article XIIIA of the California Constitution and Proposition 39 as they apply to the bonds and the net proceeds thereof. Management is responsible for the El Camino Community College District's compliance with those requirements. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the El Camino Community College District's compliance with such requirements thereof based on our examination.

Our examination was conducted in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and, accordingly, included examining, on a test basis, evidence about the District's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures, as we considered necessary in the circumstances. We believe that our examination provides a reasonable basis for our opinion. Our examination does not provide a legal determination on El Camino Community College District's compliance with specified requirements.

In our opinion, the El Camino Community College District complied, in all material respects, with the aforementioned requirements for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006.

OBJECTIVES

The objectives of our Performance Audit were to:

- Document the expenditures charged to the El Camino Community College District Building Fund
 — Measure E Bond Program.
- Determine whether expenditures charged to the Building Fund Measure E Bond Program, have been made in accordance with the bond project list approved by the voters through the approval of Measure E in November 2002.
- Note any incongruities or system weaknesses and provide recommendations for improvement.
- Provide the District Board and the Measure E Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee with a
 performance audit as required under the provisions of the California Constitution and Proposition
 39.

SCOPE OF THE AUDIT

The scope of our performance audit covered the period of July 1, 2005 to June 30, 2006. The expenditures tested included all object and project codes associated with the bond projects. The propriety of expenditures for capital projects and maintenance projects funded through other State or local funding sources, other than the proceeds of the bonds, were not included within the scope of our audit. Expenditures incurred subsequent to June 30, 2006 were not reviewed or included within the scope of our audit or in this report.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In November, 2000, the voters of the State of California approved Proposition 39 authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds by California public school districts and community colleges under certain circumstances and subject to certain conditions. In November 2002, a general obligation bond proposition (Measure E) of the El Camino Community College District was approved by the voters of that District. Measure E authorized the District to issue up to \$394,516,464 of general obligation bonds to finance various capital projects and related costs, as specified in the bond measure provisions.

Pursuant to the requirements of Proposition 39, and related State legislation, the Board of Trustees of the District established a Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee and appointed its members. The principal purpose of the Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee, as set out in State law, is to inform the public as to the expenditures of the proceeds of the bonds issued pursuant to the Measure E bond authorization. The Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee is required to issue at least one report annually as to its activities and findings.

Section 1 (b)(3)(C) of Article XIIIA of the California Constitution requires the District to conduct, an annual independent performance audit to ensure that the proceeds of the bonds deposited into the Building Fund — Measure E Bond Program have been expended only for the authorized bond projects.

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PROCEDURES PERFORMED

We obtained the general ledger and the project expenditure summary reports and detail prepared by the District for the period of July 1, 2005 to June 30, 2006, for the Building Fund — Measure E Bond Program. Within the period audited, we obtained the actual invoices and other supporting documentation for a sample of expenditures to ensure compliance with the requirements of Proposition 39 and Measure E as to the bond projects. We performed the following procedures:

- We reviewed the projects listed to be funded with general obligation bond proceeds as set out in the Measure E election documents.
- We selected a sample of expenditures for the period under audit and reviewed supporting documentation to ensure that such funds were properly expended on the authorized bond projects.
- We verified that funds from the Building Fund Measure E Bond Program were generally expended for the construction, reconstruction, acquisition, furnishing and equipping of District facilities constituting the authorized bond projects and we verified that funds held in the Building Fund Measure E Bond Program were not used for salaries of school administrators or other operating expenses of the District.

CONCLUSION

Based upon our procedures performed, we found that for the items tested, the El Camino Community College District has properly accounted for the expenditures of the funds held in the Building Fund — Measure E Bond Program and that such expenditures were made for authorized bond projects. Furthermore, it was noted that the funds held in the Building Fund — Measure E Bond Program, and expended by the District, were not expended for salaries of school administrators or other operating expenditures.

We did not have any new findings and recommendations as a result of our audit. We did review the implementation status of the prior year findings the results of which are reported in the following section.

STATUS OF PRIOR YEAR FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Finding 05-1- Maintenance of Measure E Website

Finding: In our review of the District website we noted the Citizens' Oversight Committee meeting agendas and minutes are not consistently posted to the District website, in a timely manner. Per Section 15280 of the Education Code, committee proceedings shall be a public record and made available on the District website.

Recommendation: The District needs to update and maintain the Measure E website in a more conscientious and timely manner.

District Response: Agendas and minutes are promptly produced, posted to the internal websites and distributed to committee members and District staff who regularly attend the meetings as support to the committee. The Director of Public Information and Marketing receives the agendas and minutes. She will be advised of this finding and recommendation to update the general website in a more timely manner.

Status: Implemented. The District updated the website up through June of 2006 and beginning in July 2006 also began to publish reports and documents given to the committee on the website.

Finding 05-2 Filing of Annual Economic Disclosure Statements

Finding: Under Government Code Requirements and Board Policy Number 2710, Board members and District administrative officials are required to file annual economic disclosure statements. Our review indicates one board member is not filing the required statement. Filing of these statements is an important element in the statutory structure to safeguard against potential conflicts of interest by District policy makers.

Recommendation: The District needs to insure that these statements are filed by all board members and officials designated.

District Response: All Board members are given the economic disclosure statements and advised of the annual filing deadlines.

Status: Implemented

Finding 05-3- Public Advertising of Bids for District Purchases

Finding: In our review of District purchases, we noted one instance in which the District inappropriately excluded a purchase from public bids. The District purchased vans from a private vendor without advertising for bids. The rationale provided us was that the price quote from the private vendor would be less than price quotes from a state contract which is not required to be bid when trade-in allowances are factored in and later that the vendor was the sole source for the purchase. However, the Public Contract and Education Code sections on which this is based only allows exclusion from public bids when the purchase is from a state contract.

Recommendation: The District should review its rules for excluding purchases over the legally required minimums from public advertising for bids to insure legal exclusions from bidding are being consistently and properly interpreted and applied.

District Response: The District did consult with legal counsel who felt this was an example of a sole source exception to the competition bidding requirements with much consideration of the cost savings involved. In the future we will continue to review purchasing rules very carefully so as to insure bidding requirements are consistently applied.

Status: No similar situation was found in the 2005-06 audit.
