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## El Camino College CommUnity Walk: "Hate Has No Home Here"

On March 26, El Camino College hosted a "CommUnity Walk" around the campus to call awareness against anti-Asian hate speech and crimes in several communities throughout the South Bay. In anticipation of the fall 2022 opening of El Camino's Student Social Justice Center,



as well as to promote continued awareness about incidents of racism and hate crimes within the South Bay area, the public was invited to join a "CommUnity Walk Against Hate" in a peaceful walk through

Unified by the motto, "Hate Has No Home Here," community members joined El Camino students, faculty and staff, and over 300 participants for a one-mile walk around campus to show public support for diversity, tolerance, and human dignity. El Camino College Superintendent/President Dr. Brenda Thames welcomed community members to campus, and asked attendees to join her in taking a stand against racism and discrimination.

Local elected officials including Congresswoman Maxine Waters, Senator Steven Bradford, Assemblymember Al Muratsuchi, and Ara An representing Los Angeles County Supervisor Holly Mitchell participated in the event by speaking and showing their support for the message "Hate Has No Home Here". El Camino Community College District Board of Trustees members Nilo Michelin, Kenneth Brown, Cliff Numark and Trisha Murakawa were also present. Torrance Mayor Patrick Furey and his wife

Terry joined the group, as did Jennifer LaMarque, representing LA County Supervisor Janice Hahn, and Sirley Cuevas, Lawndale City Councilmember. Speakers also shared personal stories of how they have been impacted by racism and how gathering in solidarity for the CommUnity Walk creates allies for vulnerable communities who live in fear. The group Seniors Fight Back hosted



a free self-defense class following the walk. Pepper spray, safety alarms and whistles were distributed. ECC was honored with the Outstanding Diversity Program Award by the Torrance Area Chamber of Commerce at their annual Educate, Celebrate and Elevate Diversity event on April 28.



## Student Spotlight: El Camino College STEM Students Launch Startup

NASA program helps students explore entrepreneurial opportunities using science expertise

grant awarded earlier this year from the NASA Minority University Research & Education Project (MUREP) Innovation & Tech Transfer Idea Competition (MITTIC). They managed to juggle their busy schedules to create a presentation for NASA executives and potential investors earlier this year.

"It is a bit difficult but it's well worth it," said Noe Servellon, an El Camino electrical engineering major. "A lot of our core work gets done during weekends, post-exam weeks, holidays, and wherever else we can squeeze in an extra hour."

The El Camino team drafted a 14-page concept paper for a 3D printing business and was selected as one of eight finalists to present at a Space Tank virtual immersion experience at NASA Johnson Space Center. Designed as a "Shark Tank"-style competition, students pitched their idea to NASA engineers, and then finalists were selected based on innovation and creativity.

The El Camino College team competed against top university teams and was awarded \$5,000 to launch their business. The team has since formed a partnership with Virginia Tech University through the Tech Center Research Park Accelerator Network Program, which led to an all-expenses paid trip to Virginia where the students gained entrepreneurial training as they continued to develop the product.

"My team and I put the work in, from working in different time zones to accommodating everyone's personal and academic schedule: we have all found a way get things done." said Moises Santander, an El Camino electrical engineering major.

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## **Alumni Spotlight: Dennis Mangers, Class of '59**

Dennis Mangers has had a long history in Sacramento as an Assembly member, political adviser and lobbyist. He was recognized as an El Camino College Distinguished Alumni 25 years ago with the "Original 50" Distinguished Alumni.

After attending El Camino, he graduated from California State University, Long Beach, and then received his master's degree in Educational Administration from the University of Southern California. Mangers began his career as a teacher and principal. He served in the Assembly from 1976 to 1980, representing the 73rd Orange County district as a Democrat. He has two adult children and two grandchildren. He is married to Michael Sestak.

### This is his story:

My father gave a party for Linda and me when I was elected Student Body President and she had been named Homecoming Queen. The next morning, he died of a sudden heart attack in our driveway at just 44 vears of age. We were living in a little two room house dad had built for us in Lawndale and we were left almost

penniless. I was determined to drop out of school to

get a job to help support my mom and two brothers, but then El Camino President, Dr. Stuart Marsee and his wife Audrey, heard about dad's passing and called my mom and me in for a chat. The upshot was that they insisted I not drop out and proceeded to help me get part-time work that enabled me to finish my AA at El Camino and to move onto Cal State Long Beach for a BA

The Dr. Nadine Ishitani Hata Memorial Cherry Blossom Festival honors the college's former Vice President of Academic Affairs, who passed away in 2005. Dr. Hata was an internationally known scholar devoted to academia and community work. She was instrumental in bringing the cherry trees to campus 22 years ago, one of the many programs she supported during her 34-year career at El Camino College. American Honda Motor Co., Inc. donated the cherry trees in 2005 and generously contributed to an endowed scholarship in Dr. Hata's name.

The plaque was placed among the cherry trees as a permanent part of the landscape.





## No Debate: El Camino's Forensic Team is Great!

In March 2022, eight El Camino College students competed at the National Parliamentary Debate Association Championship Tournament (NPDA). At NPDA, El Camino College was the only community college competing against schools such as UC Berkeley, Rice University, San Diego State University, and the University of Oregon.

El Camino earned many top honors, including four first place finishes in the Season Long Sweepstakes category, for accumulating the most points at tournaments throughout the season. These included Overall (2 & 4-Years), Two-Year Division, Novice Division (2 & 4-Years) and Junior Division (2 & 4-Years). In the Tournament Sweepstakes, El Camino was awarded First Place in the Two-Year Division, for the school

who accumulated the most points at the tournament.

Additionally, six El Camino students competed at the prestigious National Parliamentary Tournament of Excellence. Like NPDA, this tournament is against other four-year colleges and universities. However, participation in this tournament is by invitation-only, based on points earned throughout the season. Two of the El Camino College teams advanced to elimination rounds with one of the teams finishing the year as the top community college debate partnership in the nation!

Finally, this year for the first time in El Camino College's history, the forensics team won the overall Phi Rho Pi National Championship in St. Charles, Missouri. Congratulations to our amazing Forensics Team for all their success!
