The South Bay Promise Signing Ceremony Features Keynote Speaker and Education Leader, Senator Ben Allen

Friday, May 11, 2018 will be a monumental day at El Camino College. Superintendent/President Dr. Dena P. Maloney has invited the

superintendents from the school districts served by the El Camino Community College District* (ECCCD) South Bay Promise Program to

come together in a formal ceremony to sign a new Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). The South Bay Promise Program provides free enrollment fees for up to 500 high school graduates in the South Bay who commit to attend El Camino College in the fall immediately following graduation, enroll full-time, and complete the matriculation steps to help ensure success.

A highlight of the South Bay Promise Signing Ceremony will be Keynote Speaker Senator Ben Allen, known for his leadership as the chair of the Senate Education Committee and the legislature's Joint Committee on the Arts. Senator Allen is a key advocate for students and schools throughout his district and in the state of California.

California State Senator Ben Allen was elected in 2014 to represent the 26th Senate District, covering the Westside, Hollywood and coastal South Bay communities of Los Angeles County.

Senator Allen grew up in the 26th District. He is a former board member, and board President, of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District, where he was a leader on issues of environmental

sustainability, financial accountability, and community engagement. He helped pass a \$385 million bond measure which upgraded district facilities using environmental best practices and created good local jobs. During his tenure, the district enacted policies to provide all students with high-quality educational opportunities regardless of their background or means. He helped start the Los Angeles Spark Program, a nonprofit organization that connects at-risk middle school students with apprenticeships.

Honoring his Friend

Sterling Franklin creates an endowed scholarship to honor his friend, Christine Knox

A new endowment fund has been established at El Camino College to provide scholarships for students who attend El Camino's evening program. The Christine Knox Endowed Scholarship Fund was created by a \$30,000 gift from Sterling Franklin, Trustee of the Morris S. Smith Foundation, to honor his friend, Christine Knox. Knox taught Accounting classes in the evening program at El Camino College from 1980 until her retirement in 2006. She also worked during the day for 25 years for several companies, including 14 years as the Executive Assistant to the CEO of Crown Bolt, Inc., a Home Depot Supply Company. The \$500 scholarship will be awarded each semester to one evening Accounting student who qualifies for financial aid.

Franklin earned his B.A. in Political Science at Stanford in 1968. He gained his teaching credential from USC in 1969 and taught 10th grade Geography and 12th grade Civics at Morningside High School in Inglewood, California from 1969 to 1972, earning his MSEd. in 1970 from USC. He then attended Loyola Law School (Los Angeles) and received his JD in 1975. He received his Master's in Public Administration from USC in 1976. He has worked for non-profit organizations and has practiced law. He has been a Trustee of the Morris S. Smith Foundation since the Foundation was established in 1993. High School Students Commit to South Bay Promise Program

The South Bay Promise creates a seamless transition from high school to college, and ensures students are supported for success once they arrive at El Camino College. Not only will participating students' enrollment fees be waived for their first year, but they are offered priority registration and guaranteed placement into English

and math during their first year. South Bay Promise students have access to designated counselors to help select transfer pathways of study or preparation for entering the workforce through Career Technical Education.
All Promise students must be full-time students carrying 12 or more units. Once students are enrolled in courses, they receive tutoring and other academic support to encourage educational

success. Students are connected with a cohort group in order to build community and strengthen student engagement. The South Bay

Workforce Investment Board supports the program by offering their services to Promise students, including resume building, interview preparation, and hiring events. The mission of the South Bay



Promise is to encourage local high school students to attend El Camino College, creating a more educated and sustainable workforce that bolsters the economy and boosts college completion rates. The South Bay Promise is currently funded by the El Camino College Foundation and South Bay community partners.

Onizuka Space Science Day

El Camino College's annual Onizuka Space Science Day brought nearly 1,000 5th to 12th grade students to campus on March 10. An inspiring keynote



address was provided by NASA astronaut Robert Shane Kimbrough, who was also available for a question-and-answer session. Chemistry demonstrations, a paper airplane contest, physics puzzles, a robotics demonstration, and an eggdrop finale were just a few of the science activities led by ECC professors and guests from other institutions, such as the Space and Missile Systems Center at LA Air Force Base, Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL), and the Natural History Museum of Los Angeles County. The free event was open to the public and sponsored by ECC, the Astronaut Ellison S. Onizuka Memorial Committee, and American Honda Motor Company.

El Camino College Baseball Team Named "Scholar Team"

The El Camino College baseball team was recently selected to receive a Scholar Team Award by the California Community College Athletic Association (CCCAA). One of 18 programs statewide to receive this award, the team was honored at the annual CCCAA Convention in March

The Scholar Team Award is the highest academic team achievement given annually by the CCCAA. All team members must show academic excellence, with a total GPA of 3.0 or higher. The teams must also demonstrate better than average accomplishments in intercollegiate athletic competition. The Warriors also sent 12 players on to play at four-year universities, including SCC Pitcher of the Year Taylor Rashi (144 strikeouts) to the University of California, Irvine and standout catcher Trevor Casanova to California State University, Northridge. Academically,


